OFFICIAL EXTRAVAGANCE.

The Democratic platform of Pennsylvania declares unmistakably against ex-travagance and corruption in the administration of government. For six years the Democratic nominee for Governor has been exercising the duties of an office in which he has had to deal with just these things. The Federal taxation in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1880, was \$330,000,000. In the following year it amounted to \$360,-000,000. In the fiscal year just closed it amounted to \$405,000,000, an increase in two years of \$75,000,000. In theme an time, owing to the reduction of the principal and interest of the public debt, the ordinary expenditures of the Government have been rapidly diminishing. In 1880 the payments on account of interest and premium on the public debt were \$98,000,-000; in 1881, \$83,000,000, or a decrease of last year was \$70,000,000 and for the fiscal year just begun the interest account will be about 865,000,000.
