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THIRD EDITION. SATURDAY EVENING, AUG. 5, 1882. AT THE CAPITAL. TO-DAY'S PROCEEDINGS IN CONGRESS.

Causes of Republican Senators—The Tax and Knit Goods Bills to be Presented to a Vote. WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—In the Senate the bill on motion of Miller (N. Y.) was laid aside informally and knit goods bill was taken up. Miller proceeded to address the Senate upon the bill. In the House consideration of business on the speaker's table was proceeded with. On motion of Mr. Thomas (Ills.), a joint resolution was passed committing the secretary of the navy to convene a court of inquiry to investigate the circumstances attending the loss of the Jeannette. Mr. Dingley (Me.) asked leave to put upon its passage the joint resolution providing for a joint select committee of three senators and six representatives to inquire into the condition and wants of American shipbuilding and ship-owning interests. Leave was granted and the joint resolution was passed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 5.—The conference committee on the naval appropriation bill, as meeting this morning, agreed to the only clauses in controversy which were in regard to the closing of the navy yards. The Senate conference receded from their disagreement. As agreed upon the bill leaves the closing of navy yards to the discretion of the secretary of the navy.

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WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—It is the president's purpose to fill all existing vacancies in the various branches of the government before the adjournment of Congress. He is now promptly dispatching all the executive orders, has appointed several candidates for the office of secretary of the navy. He is now in New York city on Wednesday evening next.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The president sent the following nominations to the Senate to-day: Ulysses S. Grant, and W. H. Trescott to be commissioners to negotiate a commercial treaty with Mexico, John H. Dillon, of Missouri, to be secretary of the legation of the United States in Mexico.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The Republican Senators decide to Press it to a Vote. WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The Republican members of the Senate held a caucus to-day and discussed for an hour or more the subject of continuing the consideration of the tax bill. The caucus was fully attended, and with few dissenting expressions, the opinion prevailed that Congress should not adjourn without adopting in some form a bill to relieve the people from the present burden of taxation.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The Twelfth Illinois Democrat caucus was adjourned to meet at Beardstown, next Tuesday. The last ballot for congressman was the 1,304th and stood, Singleton 26, Wike 23, Withers 14, Goodrich 7, which was substantially the same as the first.

ABABI ATTACKED. Serious Engagement in Progress Near Kamleh. LONDON, Aug. 5.—A dispatch to Reuters telegram company dated Alexandria, 6:35 o'clock this morning, says: "At 5 o'clock this afternoon the British troops with a number of field guns served by sailors attacked the advance guard of Arabi Pacha, near Kamleh, between the Hamamoonah canal and the Cairo railway, firing upon the enemy's position from three sides. The engagement, which is of a serious nature, still continues. Arabi Pacha sent fourteen men with a white flag to the British camp this morning. The party was received by Major Pringle, but the interview was without result."

Probably a Fatal Tragedy. RICHMOND, Va., August 5.—Christopher Goode, colored, who last night about midnight shot and killed another negro named Winston Robinson, who he found in his house under very suspicious circumstances, and then shot his own wife, inflicting injuries that are probably fatal, was arrested and brought before the police court this morning and committed to jail.

A Hard Lot. CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—The Ready family, consisting of a mother, two daughters, three adopted girls, all of tender age, who were recently arrested for abducting, have turned out to be the nucleus of a very bad gang, which, through their confessions, has been discovered, and which appears to have stolen extensively from all parts of the city. Mrs. Ready was rapidly growing rich from the pilfering of her brood.

A Bolt Against Cobb. BEDFORD, Ind., August 5.—The Democrats of this (the Second) congressional district are alarmed at the announcement that A. J. Hostetter, ex-Democratic congressman, has become a Republican and candidate against T. R. Cobb. Hostetter is popular and will receive the support of the Republicans and Greenbackers, who will make nominations.

England's Occupation of Suez Announced. LONDON, August 5.—The Times correspondent at Berlin says the greater part of the German press referring to the occupation of Suez by the British, acknowledges that England has acted wisely in occupying positions which now are of great importance to it.

The Boston Walking Match. BOSTON, Aug. 5.—The score in the walking match at 11 a. m. stood: Hart 496 miles, Normand 463, Harriman 464 and Campagna 343.
