#### The Secret of Good Butter

iermantown Telegraph. Every one knows how superior is the reputation of Philadelphia butter, and many have the attempts been to account and hay fields—the grass which often gives so peculiar a fragrance to meadow hay. But it needed very little reasoning to demolish such a theory as their. This grass is one of the poorest for hay or pas-ture purposes and scarcely exists, except on cold, clay lands, in partially shady places, near groves or low woods. Yet while this grass is the exception, indeed the very rare exception, in low pastures, or in the hay fed to our cows, good butter

is the general rule in all our markets. It has long been the opinion of our best agricultural generalizers of facts that we owe much more of the sweetness of our butter to the abundance of springs and spring houses in our state, than to any thing peculiar which grows in our pastures. Milk has a particular affinity for any odors in the atmosphere, and water has some, hence whatever impuri-ties may get into the atmosphere of the spring house is drawn out by running water and the very best security is pro-vided against their being absorbed by the

We notice this now through observing an inquiry whether the light of a kerosene lamp in a dairy could possibly affect the quality of the butter; we should answer most decidedly in the affirmative. All odors of every description should be carefully avoided if the very best braud is

There is one little incident in this reputation of Philadelphia butter which must never be forgotten. The followers of Penn made up a large class of our original farming population. With these people cleanliness was especially one of the virtues. It was not a mere sentiment that it was "next to godliness," but an every-day testimony in all they did.

Aided in these cleanly practices by their numerous springs and spring-houses, we have little doubt BLANKETS! we owe to them as much as to any other ircumstances the eminent character which Philadelphia butter enjoys; and we believe that if other quarters would give special attention to these little niceties, as good butter might be had in any part of the Union as here. Nevertheless, we are obliged to add that there is a good deal of poor butter sold in Philadelphia made in the castern counties, arising we think from those having a small dairy churning only halt as often as they should.

Red Spider on Fruit Trees and Hedger. Germantown Telegraph.

Among the insect enemies of the fruitgrower it is singular that no one has referred much to the red spider. It is a small enemy, to be sure, but one by no means to be despised. It makes up by its immense number for its diminutive appearance. They appear larger than those we find in greenhouses on roses, fuchias and other tender plants; but whether or not they are different species to these, are natives to the soil, or are introductions from some other parts, are questions which may, perhaps, interest the ento-mologist, but will hardly aid in the destruction of the foe.

We suppose on large trees the labor would be too great to attempt any means for their eradication, but for young trees and evergreen hedges in general, which are easily reached, it might be well worth while to try to keep them down. The popular receipt in garden books is to mix flour of sulphur in greasy water and then syringe with it, of course keeping the mouth of the syringe near the surface of the water while drawing up the liquid, as the oily and sulphury water floats only on the top, and is drawn into the syringe only in that way. This greasy liquid causes the sulphur to adhere to the leaves, and it is said the red spider adaudous these leaves in disgust.

The hot dry atmosphere of our country is peculiarly favorable to the existence of the red spider; and when we know how great a pest it is to the fruit-growers under glass, it seems to us well worth looking after when it undertakes to fasten ou our fruit trees in the open air.
