GILBERT AND SULLIVAN. What Their New Opera is About,

Miss Helen Lenoir, who has been managing Mr. D'Oyley Carte's recent tours in England, returned to New York yesterday on the White Star steamer Republic to make arrangements for the production in this city and elsewhere of several new operas by one or more of Mr. D'Oyley Carte's companies. Miss Lenoir said to a reputer, when asked whether Gilbert and Suilivan's new opera was included in the repretory; "Yes, it will be produced here about the 16th of November. By the way, it is not called The Princess as currently reported. It has not yet been christened. Mr. Gilbert has completed the libretto, but the music is not yet finished. Mr. Sullivan has hid himself in some out-ofthe-way place in Switzerland that he may escape the distractions of London and devote all his energies to the completion of

"Can you give a description of the "I don't mind giving you a glimpee of it, but, as the work is not yet completed, Mr. Bullivan would not like me to tell too much about it. Of course it has not yet been rehearsed, but I have had the libretto read to me and have heard some of the music. As in all Mr. Gilbert's comic op ras there is not much plot. The hero of the piece is named Straphon. His mother is a fairy and as such is exempted from the ravages of time and the infirmi-ties of age. She always looks young and charming. Stephon's father was not so favored, being a fairy only from the walst down. Sterphon, of course, has a sweet-heart. She becomes jealous of his mother and will not believe that the facinatlady, who appears to be about on, is her prospective mother— The other principal char-are a Lord Chancellor of England and a Queen of the Fairies. The latter part will have to be played by a lady who possesses an abundance of adipose The part is something like that of Lady Jane in Patience, and that of the Fairy Mother, which is assigned to the prima douna of the company, corresponds somewhat to that of Patience. The gentlemen of the chorus are 'Peers of England,' and appear in their coronets and robes. The opera contains many catching airs and tunes. The Lord Chancellor aings a song which is destined to become very popular. Strephon sings a very taking song to his fairy mother. It is some-thing of a parody on Tennyson's 'Queen of the May.' The refrain runs: 'I'm to be married to-day, mother; I'm to be married to-day.' The part of Strephon will be played by Mr. Carleton. Mr. Ryley will sustain the character of the Lord Chancellor. "The opera," continued Miss Lenoir, "is in two acts and is about the same length as Patience. It is understood that Mr. Gilbert will be here to rehearse it in October. The first criminal case in "graveyard insurance annals came to a termination at Harrisburg in the conviction (for obtaining money under false pretences) of L. B. Hummel, secretary of the notorious Mahoning insurance company of Seliusgrove, Suyder county, which is now in the hands of a receiver. It seems that the company issued a circular in June, 1881, giving the number of members in class 5, known as the "Old People's" class. The list was a pretty large one, and L. Fitting, I. M. Morley and W. H. Palmer, the prosecutors, were taken with the idea of insuring their subject in the Mahoning. They visited Selinsgrove and were informed by Hummel that the circular, as issued, was correct, and the investment a good one. They placed "their man" in the Mahoning, and in died the, as was probably expected, he died. On November 1, 1881, when they went for their money, they were informed that there was nothing coming to them, but that, on the contrary, they owed the com pany \$34. They examined the books and found that on June 1, when the delusive circular was issued, there were but half as many members in the "class" as represented. The defense showed the number who had paid assessments, and that the discrepancy in numbers complained of by the prosecutors represented the number of members who had refused to pay assessments on June 1, 1881. The jury believed the prosecutors and found Hummel guilty. Judge Hickes, of York, tried the case. Judge McPher-son, who represented the insurance com missioner in the proceedings against the company to revoke its charter, declining to try it. A motion in arrest of judgment was made, and Hummel was placed under \$500 bail until next month, when the motion will be heard.
