The Clever Trick by Which They Secured Valuable Gems.

London Standard. The case of two clever English rogues, Fulton and Watson, came on for hearing yesterday. It was they who, last winter, stole from a jeweler, Mme. Chauvet, in the Rue des Capucines, diamonds to the value of 236,000 francs. The robbery was perpetrated in the following daring fashion: A man calling himself Col. Gaston presented himself in Mme Chauvet's shop, and requested to be shown some diadems, diamonds, necklaces, &c. His manners were so good and his dress so elegantly correct in every respect that the merchand had no hesitation is spreading before ner customer her most valuable gems. Of these the swindler made a lavish choice, and asked Mme Chauvete to place them in a black hand-bag he had brought on purpose. In payment the pretended colonel offered a check on a foreign bank, which was refused. "Wait a moment," cried the blackleg, "I will get it changed at the bank and bring you notes. Keep the hand bag; I shall be back directly." So saying he disappeared. Almost immediately be had left the shop a respectably dressed woman entered and requested to be shown a certain ring in the shop window. While Mme. Chauvet was occupied in getting the ring the "colonel's" accomplice succeeded in adroitly substituting an absolutely similar handbag for the one left on the counter. This done, she quickly chose her ring and left. When evening came without her customer returning, Mme. Chauve opened the bag-which she thought was the same one that "the colonei" had left-and discovered that she had not robbed. When Fulton and Watson were arrested in Belgium for other diamond robberies, several of the stones stolen from Mme. Chauvet were found in their possession. Fulton was yesterday sentenced to four, Watson, the pretended colonel, to five years imprison-

THE GREAT COMET. The Elements of Its Orbit Computed at

An approximate computation of the elements of the new coment, completed by Mr. S. C. Chandler, jr., at Harvard observatory, based upon the observation of Professor Swift, of Cincinnati, on the 18th inst, at 1:30 p. m. on the 19th instant, at Cambridge, and that at 11 o'clock a. m., on the 20th instant, also at Cambridge is as follows: Time of perihelion passage 1882, August 30; longitude of perihelion 271°, longitude of node 173°, inclination of orbit 17°, perihelion distance 27,000,000 miles. At the time of the first observation the comet was about 36,000,000 miles from the earth, and at the time of the three observations 32,500,000 miles. This corresponds to a rate of peed of 1,500,000 miles a day. Assuming the above to be correct, the comet will approach within 15,000,000 miles of the earth, being nearest in the early part of October, but will then be visible only in the Southern Hemisphere, and will probably be visible above the horizon for a few days here a little before sunrise.

NEW RAILROADS.

Cha-ters for Lines to Pagentzville from Lan-caster, Beading and Philadelphia. A dispatch to the Philadelphia Times from West Chester says: A number of New York railroad mon were at the falls of French Creek, in the

western part of Chester county, on Wednesday, looking over the route of a pro-posed railroad from Lancaster to Phonixville, a charter granted in 1873 being used. Directly in the route adopted is a local railroad in Lancaster county, seven miles in length, which has been purchased to form part of the proposed line. From Paccaixville it will run through the Skippack valley and Bucks county. It is expected that the average cost of the road will be about \$41,000 per mile. It is an-nounced that the board of directors will hold a meeting in Philadelphia on the 26th instant for the purpose of awarding contracts for its construction.

HARRISBURG, Sept. 21.—A charter has been issued to the Philadelphia Norristown and Phonixville railroad company, which proposes to undertake the construction of a railroad from a point on the Pennsylvania railroad between Girard avenue atation and Radnor station, to Phoenixville, a distance of twenty-five miles. The capital stock is one million dollars. The Pennsylvania railroad company is building the line. The Phonix-ville, Pottstown and Reading railroad was also chartered to-day with a capital stock of one million dollars. It intends to construct a road from Phonixville to Reading. This line will also be under the control of the Pennsylvania railroad company.
