FAVORED BY FORTUNE.
WON A MILLION DOLLARS IN A MONTH
How an American Theatrical Manager Gained a Fortune at Baccarat—A Story that might be True.
William Deutsch, the theatrical manager formerly with Florence, is now the talk of all Paris. A correspondent of the Chicago News writing from that city says that recently, within four weeks, Deutsch won over a million francs playing at baccarat. "It is a simple, solemn truth," he has cleared a cool \$200,000 in less than twenty-five days—that is to say, an average of about \$8,000 a day. No one will say that that was a bad speculation. Nine or ten months ago Deutsch arrived in Paris, and in a short time was enrolled as a member of two or three of the leading clubs of the capital. He went into them for the purpose of "taking a hand," but he commenced quietly. He knew nothing about the game, and although there is no particular skill required in baccarat, he wanted to study it for all it was worth. After a while he grew bolder, and four months ago I was informed that he was winning heavily. When he was ahead 500,000 francs he went one night to the Casino de la Ville, and there he lost it all. He was not about as often as he lost, but neither his winnings nor his losses were to any amount. Just before midnight the prince knocked down to him for a very large sum. He then announced that the betting was finished. It was one of those opportunities that Deutsch had been waiting for, and he betted every franc that he had with him.
"Cinq cent billets de mille!" he said very quietly.
Only those grouped around the table heard him. It was unusual for a player to bet 500 bank notes of \$1,000 each, but everybody present was too well bred to make any sort of noise over it.
"Do you mean it?" asked the princely banker, very politely.
"Certainly, sir," said Deutsch.
The prince dealt a card to the right, one to the left, and one to himself; then another to the right, to the left, and to himself. He glanced at the two cards—
"I give," said he.
The ace of spades fell to the right. The six of clubs fell to that player, and he lost, as also did all who were betting on his side of the table. On the left sat Deutsch, cool, and to all appearances the most unconcerned player in the room. He did not draw. He held a seven spot, and that is to say, several. Every good player would have stood the same as he did. The dealer had in hand a four spot, and of course he drew to it. The chances were now largely in favor of Deutsch's winning, because the probabilities of the hand drawing the right card were very remote. In order to win it was absolutely necessary for him to draw either a four or five spot; with a three spot he could only call it a stand off, and with anyone of the ten other cards he was sure to lose. So everybody that knew the position of affairs felt satisfied that their friend would win. It was at that moment dollars to doughnuts that he could not lose, and the looked-for million seemed to be within his grasp. The prince turned his card, and it was a four spot, by all that was lucky!
"Eight," said he.
"I lose," said the American.
He played a few more hands and got back \$3,000 or \$4,000, but at midnight he went home. There he found some of the boys sitting around the dining room table. He took a hand, and after that for several nights in succession stuck to the noble game that General Bub Schneck introduced with such diplomatic success into the court of St. James. A month ago Deutsch went back to baccarat, and on the more fortune began to smile upon him. This time he laid down certain rules for his guidance, and he stuck to them. If he saw that he was losing he would not go beyond a certain amount; so long as he then he went to bed. The next day his winnings were deposited with his American banker, and that night, when he returned to the club, it would be with only a limited amount in his possession. Sometimes this pocket money amounted to 50,000 francs, but more frequently it was less than half that sum. Every night he won something, and the thousands quickly grew into the hundreds of thousands. When he had won 750,000 francs, Mr. Maurice Grau and myself advised him to quit playing. His reply was:
"No, gentlemen, not before I get my million. I am bound to get it before long."
He was right. Grau wished him luck, and went off to America with Theo. I wished him luck, too, and went a-fishing. Three days later I breakfasted with him, and when I reached his house I saw at once that he had gained his point.
"Lucky last night?" said I.
"So so," he answered jauntily.
"Worth a million to-day, aren't you?"
"Mor'n a million," said he.
And we both smiled a pale-cherry with-an-egg-in-the-centre smile, and then he told me how he had finally left off with just 3,000 francs over a million.
After he had gained his million he invested half of the amount in United States bonds. He also bought shares in two or three French manufacturing establishments, in all about \$25,000 francs' worth. He has purchased some splendid diamonds, three or four fine carriages, a large quantity of bed and table linen, etc., etc. He will leave Paris with his bonds and securities, about \$25,000 in hard cash, and the ship's hold full of trunks and boxes.
A few nights ago Deutsch dropped into the club with only a few thousand francs in his pocket. He won and he lost until very soon he was about 35,000 francs to the bad. He asked the house for a temporary loan, but the cashier did not happen to have it at the time. Then some of these Frenchmen played a shrewd game on this innocent American.
"The Yankee is out of luck to-night," said the Count Thing-a-ma-jig to the Viscount Tricolor and Monsieur le Colonel Two Swords. "Let us assist him in his want by furnishing the caise with 25,000 francs to be loaned to him." The idea was agreed to by the others, and very soon the money was in the hands of the house cashier.
Mind you, this money is to be loaned to no one but Monsieur Deutsch," said they, and their orders were obeyed. Mr. D. was notified that he could have the money, and he reflected for a few moments. This is the way he commended with himself: "Some one or more of the fellows from whom I have been winning have furnished the bank with this money. They know that I am not in luck, and they want to keep me here at play while I take this money and lose it, and in this way they count on my losing a hundred thousand francs or more before I am satisfied. Well, I'll take the money, and I'll just make one bet if I lose, perhaps more than one if I win." So he borrowed the 25,000 francs and betted on the first hand that was dealt him. He won, and he kept on winning until he had not
