Pattison's Unqualified Denial. A reporter of the Times was at once dispatched to present the Gallagher version of his Independence hall speech to Controller Pattison, and the young gubernatorial candidate was found quietly resting at his modest home, apparently free from all anxiety about the political turmoil that is surging around him. WHAT PATTISON DID SAY.

The Speech as Reported in The Times, The Ledger, Press and Record. The speech referred to by Gallagher and Delancy was delivered on the steps of In-dependence hall on Thursday, January 28, 1881. [Cheers.] The American people brought a king to his feet for a less offense than that which you have suffered at the hands of the bosses of both parties in this city. The sixty-six delegates who have stood by John Hunter in convention to-day have taken the bull by the norns, and if they keep on as they began they will have him where they want him. [Cheers and laughter.] Assert your manhood and independence. Be like freemen and not like slaves. But it will do no good for me to stand here and talk to you. Go to your homes, talk with your neighbors, organize in your wards, and as sure as the sun shines to-morrow John Hunter will be the next receiver of taxes."
