MILLAIS' TENNYSON.

Some Estimate of the Fost and the Picture in Mezzotint. The London times says : No memorial of a writer whose name stands so high and bright before the world as that of Alfred Tennyson can fail to arouse interest. Whatever may be the place he is destined to hold in the hierarchy of poets-and criticism has not yet said its last word upon the point-it is undeniable that he has given a new charm to life, has kept alive the sacred lamp of song in a rather prosaic and utilitarian age, and has even justified the existence of an office formerly held by Nahum Tates and Pyes His early efforts, if not free from unfortunate conceits, were dignified by rare beauty of thought and expression, and the pro mise they held forth was more than re-deemed by the fruits of his genius at his maturity. Half a century has elapsed since he made his first appearance in the arena of letters, but the pen has not yet dropped from his hand. It was once maintained that the gift of poetry is possessed only by the young. "Monsieur," said the Duc de Montausier, the presumed original of Alceste in the "Mi santhrope," to the great Corneille, whose creative power declined after his thirty-fourth year. "Monsieur, quand j'etais jeune je fassais de jolis vers," soon to be forgotten ; "a present que je suis vieux mon genie est eteiat ; eroyez-moi, laissons faire des vers a la jounnesse." Mr. Ten nyson supplies one of a few remarkable instances to the contrary. It is true that we can no longer expect him to renew his best achievements, but his later productions, "The Cup" in especial, have much of the far-reaching imagination and force of word painting which assure to his "Arthurian" and other poems, a lasting place in English literature. In the briefest glance at his work, too, it should be remembered that his influence has inva-

It was only in the fitness of things that such a man as the author of La Mort d'Arthur and Locksley Hall should have a place on the canvas of the Reynolds of his time; and within the last few years, as everybody knows, this desideratum has been supplied. How well Mr. Millias has executed his task we need hardly say. Dispensing with accessories, he represents Mr. Tennyson standing in his quaintly cut cloak against a background of shadow, directly facing the beholder, and with the ample felt hat in his hand. Slightly idealized, the portrait may yet be accepted as strikingly true, particularly in the penetrating and half inquiring expression of the eyes. Generally, porhaps, the face has a somewhat sad and pensive appearance, as though the spirit in which In Memoriam was written had returned to him during the sittings. Mr. Oldham Barlow has just executed a faithful and finished reproduction in mezzotint of this picture, and the public may be congratulated on having within their reach a finely artistic record in his old age of a man to whom many of them owe so large a debt of gratitude.

How a Woman Keeps Accounts. From the Atlanta Constitution.

It is a touching sight to see a woman begin to make up her expenses having firmly resolved to put down every cent she spends, so as to find out how to economize, and where all the money goes. Procuring a small book, she makes due entry, and on the Monday after the first Saturday in which her husband brings home his pay, she carefully tears the margin off a newspaper and, with a blunt pencil, strikes a trial balance something in this way :

John brought me home \$48.40, and \$1.43 I had is \$49.93, and \$1.00 l lent Mrs. Dixon is \$50.93—but hold on, I ought not to enter that, because when she returns it, it'll go down. That was \$49.93, aud what have I done with that?

Then she puts down the figures, leaving out the items to save time-a process which enables her to leave out most of the items to where a round sum is involved, on the supposition that they have already been put down. As thus :

Six dollars and fourteen cents for moat, and 10 cents for celery, and 10 cents on the street cars, and a bad 5 cent piece I got in exchange, and \$2.81 I paid the milkman-who owes me 19 cents-that's \$3, and 15 cents at church, and the gro ceries-they were either \$15.60 or 16.60 and I don't remember which they were, bat I guess it must have been \$15.60, for the grocer said that if I would give him a dime he would give me half a dollar. which would make even change, and I couldn't, because the smallest I had was a quarter-and \$2.75 for mending Katie's shoes, which is the last money that shoemaker ever gets from me, and 10 cents for celery-no, I put that down.

Finally she sums up her trial-balance sheet, and finds that it foots up \$64.28. which is about \$15 more than she had originally. She goes over the list several times and checks it carefully, but all the items are correct, and she is just about in despair when her good angel hints that there may be a possible mistake in the addition. Acting upon the suggestion she focts up the column and finds that the total is \$44.28, and that according to the principles of the arithmetic, she ough to have \$5.65. Then she counts her cash several times, the result varying from 1.40 up to \$1.97, but then she happily discov ers that she has been mistaking a \$2 gold piece for a cent, and remembers that she gave the baby a trade dollar to ent its gum with. On the whole, she has come within 86 cents of a balance, and that, she says, is close enough, and she enters in one line of the account book: "Dr.-by household expenses," so much; and is very happy till she remembers, just before going to bed, that she had omitted \$2.75 for her husband's hat.
