

AN EDITOR'S FATAL SHOT.

A BULLET INSTEAD OF A RETRACTION... The business part of St. Louis was thrown into a state of high excitement about half-past five o'clock Friday evening by the report that John A. Cockrell, managing editor of the Post-Dispatch, had shot and killed Colonel A. W. Slayback, a prominent lawyer and well-known politician. No one directly concerned in the matter will make a statement, but Henry W. Moore, the city editor of the paper, was sitting at his desk writing, says that while Colonel Slayback was in the editorial room, Mr. Moore saw him enter and closed the door to him as he passed by. Mr. Moore turned in his chair as they passed by and observed that Colonel Slayback had his right hand in his pistol pocket, and in less than half a minute after Slayback had closed Cockrell's room Moore heard the report of a pistol. He immediately sprang up and entered the editorial room and found Slayback stretched on the floor and Cockrell bending over him, apparently wiping the blood from his face. Cockrell asked Moore to send for a physician, which he did, and a few moments later Dr. McCarthy arrived, but not until Slayback was dead, he having died about three minutes after being shot. Meanwhile Cockrell washed his hands in less than five minutes after the fatal shot was fired by Mr. Moore. He then ordered a carriage and drove away. It was said that they went to Four Courts and surrendered to the chief of police, but such was not the case, and it is not yet known where Cockrell and Slayback's brother, Charles E. Slayback, president of the Merchants' Exchange, was immediately notified of the sad event and he gave directions for the disposal of the body, which was sent to the deceased's late home. The ball from Cockrell's pistol entered Slayback's left side near the heart and ranged upward. Whether it entered the heart is not known, but it must have penetrated the lungs. An immense crowd gathered around the Post-Dispatch office and remained there till long after dark. An extra of evening paper says that Colonel Slayback had gone to the office for satisfaction or fight. When he entered the editorial rooms he and Cockrell met face to face. The colonel began to denounce Cockrell for assailing him upon him by the Post-Dispatch and in his paper the colonel drew a revolver from his pocket. Cockrell, who had the advantage by reason of his self possession, also drew his revolver and fired at Slayback, who fell, mortally wounded, and died a few moments afterward. His corpse is still within the room, surrounded by a crowd of excited friends. The trouble which terminated so tragically originated in the fact that at a political meeting on Thursday evening Colonel Slayback made a bitter onslaught on the Post-Dispatch and its reporters, to which the paper responded last evening by uncompromising references to Colonel Slayback, which rendered him so indignant that he visited the office to demand satisfaction. The following is the article which appeared in the Post-Dispatch: Mr. Alonzo W. Slayback, an individual whose chief claim to distinction rests upon the fact that he is the law partner of Col. James O. Broadhead, rose in a meeting of Democratic ward politicians in this city last night and without personal provocation proceeded to apply a string of vile and virulent epithets to the Post-Dispatch and its conductors, making charges which he knew to be false. This is the same A. W. Slayback of and concerning whom the following card was written and published in the city by John M. Glover on the 11th day of November, 1881. Mr. Glover recently ran as a Democratic candidate for Congress in the Ninth district and received a hearty endorsement from the Democratic voters of character. Mr. Glover is alive yet. (The letter referred to above was an open one by John M. Glover, accusing Col. Slayback of cowardice.)
