WATCH FACIORY PAGEANT.

A Large and Attractive Affair - Forty Wagous and Two Hundred Men in Line. The grand street parade of the Laucaster watch factory came off this afternoon and moved over the route announced yesterday. It attracted almost as much attention as Barnum and Jumbo. There were nearly forty wagons, omnibusses, coaches, cabs add buggies in line, and over two hundred employees and stockholders. The Messrs. Bitner took the right of the line and were followed by 13 two-horse wagons, each bearing two floats seven by twelve feet. The first float had a picture of Father Time, riding on a bicycle constructed of Lancaster watches. The old fellow had discarded his hourglass but held fast to his scythe. The next wagon contained well painted exterior views of the watch factory, and then followed eleven wagons, the floats-of which contained interior views of the machine shop and the plate, scrow, train, jeweling, motion escapement, balance, gilding, dial and tin ishing departments the pictures showing the belting and machinery and the men and women at work. Then followed the great old Conestoga wagon drawn by six immense horses, harnassed in the trappings of the olden time, including the six bows of bells. Then followed fifteen two horse omnibuses and coaches and several one-horse buggies containing the officers, stock-holders and employees of the factory, numbering about two hun-dred. Many of the wagons had large American flags, and the floats attracted much; attention. The big Conestoga team and all the wagons containing floats will be taken to Philadelphia, and will take part in the great Bi-Centennial parade next week.
