GENCER building, was the rallying point of the Democrats and before eight o'clock an eager, impatient throng had gathered there anxious for a morsel of good news. Tany were not, however, kept long in suspase. The Republican strongholds of the city were the first to report, and their largely reduced majorities gave ample evi dence of how the tide was running. And when the banner Democratic wards were heard from with handsome majorities for reform, the crowd greeted the announcements with deafening applause. As the returns came they were rapidly put upon the sciopticon in front of the Intelligen-CER building for the benefit of the impatient assemblage. Cheer after cheer followed each successive announcement of the glad tidings of a Democratic wave, and when New York's magnificent majority was thrown upon the screen it was greeted] with a wild tempest of applause. The tardiness of the returns from Philadelphia and Allegheny counties in-spired dread for a time and kept the crowd in an agony of suspense; but when the news of the immense fall off in the Republican vote was reported in these two Giberalters of Republicanism, the crowd could scarcely contain itself for joy. And when it was evident that Pattison had been elected by 30,000 plurality, the long pent-up spirit of enthusiasm, gaining new strength under the remembrance of Democratic defeat in the past, broke forth in a perfect whirl-wind of approbation. Old and young lifted up their voices together in testimony of their appreciation of the famous victory won. A bon-fire was lighted and its ruddy glare was reflected upon a crowd shouting itself nearly hoarse. Long after midnight, when all the indications pointed to a sweeping Democratic victory, the on. thusiastic crowd secured the City band, and, headed by it, swept up North Queen street, shouting and gesticulating like madmen. It was an event in the history of the Democracy, which shall live while human memory lasts. And the fact that the victory was a long time in coming, gives it an intensified appreciation.
