FARM AND GARDEN. Fall Notes for the Husbandmen.

Germantown Telegraph. The season is at hand when we should again say that all farmers know the value of "compost" and how to prepare it Many farmers manufacture hundreds of loads of the best manure in this way They gather together on the premise forest leaves, cornstalks, including the roots, weeds, vines, offal from fencecorners, muck from ponds and ditches occasional sprinklings of lime through the mess, layers of barnyard manure, and thus build up oblong squares and let them remain over winter. When April arrives the mass has gone through fermentation and comminution and presents a mound of fertilizing matter better than a small goldmine would be to the proprietor of the But we want to see these compostheaps in the garder, and there is no reason why they should not be there as well as upon the farm. There is rubbish enough in the garden, with the assistance of leaves, some mould from the woods, if attainable; if not, from portions of the premises where it can be spared; scrapings from the turnpike, manure from the stable, and every attainable substance that will decay through the winter. A little slacked lime will be a good assistance. A half-dozen leads of excellent manure will be manufactured by the time it is wanted in the spring, without incurring a cent of actual expense, and at the same time the garden will be cleared of its vines, stalks, weeds, and all otherwise

Clean Cider Barrels Cider making is now close at hand, and the barrels must have become very musty and mouldy and wholly unfit to use without a thorough fumigation. A scientific journal gives the following receipt for effecting this, which we hope may do :

worthless trash.

"To clean eider barrels, pour in limewater, and then insert a trace-chain through the bunghole, remembering to fasten a strong cord on the chain so as to pull it out again. Shake the barrel until all the mould inside is rubbed off. Riuse with water, and finally pour in a little whiskey."

This is simple enough and would seem to meet the requirements. Really fine cider cannot be expected when the barrels are not perfectly sweet and clean. But if any of our cider makers have a better or other methods than this, we shall be pleased to have them; and to be of use this season they should be communicated

Brandled Peaches or Plums Gather peaches before they are quite ripe, prick them with a large needle and rub off the down with a piece of flannel; put them into a preserving pan with cold water enough to cover them, and let the water become gradually scalding hot. If the water does more than simmer very will be likely to crack. When they are tender lift them carefully out and fold them in flannel, or a soft table-cloth, in several folds. Have ready a quart or more, as the peaches require, of the best white brandy, and dissolve ten onnces of powdered augar in it. When the peaches are cold put them into a glass jar, and pour the brancy and sugar over them. Cover with leather and a bladder. Apricots and plums can be done in the same
