**POLITICAL POINTS.**  
**DEMAND FOR A QUIET INAUGURATION**  
No Fuss and Feathers—Plain, Simple Democratic Government—The Press of the State in Favor of It.

Governor Pattison will be inaugurated on the 16th of January. This ceremony, which in its simplicity is nothing more than the taking of an oath and the reading of an address, has of late years been made the occasion of great pomp and display. The induction of Governor Hoyt into the gubernatorial office was accompanied by an immense amount of public show and expense, and for this reason was not a necessity. Several thousand dollars were taken out of the state treasury in order that he might have a good "send off." Governor Pattison will now have an opportunity to show that he does not countenance this fuss and feather business, which Chairman Hensel has also pronounced against. It is more in unison with the sound principles of Democratic government than everything like ostentation or heavy expenditure in the method of ushering a citizen into public office should be. The taking of the oath of office is much more impressive when the governor-elect appears before the chief justice with the surroundings of ordinary citizenship, consecrates his promise on the Holy Book, addresses his fellow-citizens as an assembly before him, and then enters his office at once to commence the public business. No military display, no pageants, no martial strains of music are needed to impress the greatness and solemnity of the simple ceremonial upon the mind of the people. It is to be hoped that Governor Pattison will earnestly discountenance the efforts to get up big parades which have no other effect than to demoralize the little town of Harrisburg and benefit its hotel keepers. Indeed, Governor Hoyt would probably also give him that advice, for when he was about to appear before the chief justice to take the oath there was such a sudden rush and crush caused by the parade as nearly carried the governor, the judges, and everybody near them, of their feet, completely robbing the ceremony of all dignity or impressiveness.  
The General sentiment of the People.  
Reading News.  
There is a general sentiment among the Democracy of the state for a plain, unpretentious inauguration of Governor Pattison. The tawdry displays that marked these occasions under "boss" rule were simply so much money out of the pockets of the taxpayers, and no one was benefited except the party hangers on, the office expectants and the horde of jobbers who have flocked about Harrisburg for years.  
The military parade never call on the conscientious, and exhibited under the form of the national guard, a power that is familiar to the despots of Europe, but has no place in a republic. The Legislature should not appropriate a dollar for the inauguration of Governor Pattison. There is no need of a show piece, nor is it incumbent upon the people to do so. Legislators are only the servants of the people, and they should respect the voice of those who elected them. The money which would be appropriated for such purposes is drawn from the tax-payers, and should be used in diminishing the public debt and defraying the legitimate expenses of the Legislature.  
It has also been the practice to furnish the executive mansion annually in a costly manner. The office of the governor was intended to be a show piece, not a tax-increment expected to use his salary to furnish entertainments to a favored few who constitute what is called "society at the capital." The great body of voters, and their mothers, wives, daughters, sisters, cousins and a host of other persons, gathered either at his residence or at his office. All extra expenses, horticultural gardens, etc., have grown with the profuseness and corruption of the shoddy period that followed the war. There should be a return to simplicity and economy, for the people have no money to spare.  
The Democracy represent the people and not a plutocracy, and if any gentlemen in the public service desire to indulge in banquets, receptions and entertainments, they should pay for the pleasure it affords them out of their own pockets.  
The Motion Seconded.  
Chairman Hensel struck the right chord in his interview with a reporter a few days ago when he said: "I would like to see a quiet, modest inauguration, with no extra expenditures or fanfangoes, and at not a dollar of expense to the state treasury. I believe 50,000 Democrats would go to Harrisburg to see and applaud such a send off." These are words of wisdom, and we hope they will be heeded by our friends. We second the motion. Let the debate go on.  
Let It Be Modest.

This is not in accordance with the desire of Mr. Pattison, and we hope nothing of the kind will be attempted. The induction into office of the reform governor of Pennsylvania should be as quiet and unostentatious as possible, and without a dollar's expense to the taxpayers. We would like to see the method of the Jefferson's inauguration revived, who hitched his horse to the fence in front of the capital and quietly took the oath of office. Let the coming ceremony be conducted with the greatest possible simplicity.  
Who Should Be Left.

It seems that a friend of Bosler placed the sticker over the name of a member of the lower House of Assembly, as a result of this the vote counted for Wagner, and Bosler failed to get the county.

**DEATH OF A NOBLE WOMAN.**  
The Lady Who for More Than Fifty Years Was the Wife of Asa Packer.  
Mrs. S. M. B. Packer, relict of the late Asa Packer, the well-known projector of the Lehigh Valley railroad and the founder of Lehigh University, died at the family mansion, in Mauch Chunk, at 1:47 yesterday morning, after an illness of a fortnight's duration. Mrs. Packer was born at Springville, now Dimmick's Four Corners, Susquehanna county, Pa., March 13, 1807, and was married to Judge Packer January 23, 1828. Three of Mrs. Packer's children survive her, viz.: Robert Packer, superintendent of Pennsylvania and New York division of the Lehigh Valley railroad, of Sayre, Pa.; Judge Harry E. Packer, vice president Lehigh Valley railroad, and Miss Mary Packer. Mrs. Lucy F. Linderman, the eldest daughter, preceded both Judge and Mrs. Asa Packer to the grave. Her surviving children were all present at her death-bed. Judge and Mrs. Packer celebrated their golden wedding January 23, 1878. It was the greatest social event that ever occurred in the Lehigh Valley. One of the daughters of the will of Judge Packer, who died in 1870, was as follows: "My purpose is that she (Mrs. Packer) shall have whatever she wishes out of my estate, and all other provisions hereof are subordinate to this one." Mrs. Packer was greatly devoted to her husband and shared all his trials and successes. She lived in Mauch Chunk since 1834. Mrs. Packer was known through a wide circle for her unobtrusive charities and good works. Recently she had caused to be erected a large chapel and Sunday school in connection with the Episcopal church in the town. The funeral will take place from the late residence in Mauch Chunk on Monday, 20th instant, at 3 o'clock p. m. She will be buried beside her husband in the family plot in Mauch Chunk cemetery, on a rugged bluff overlooking the town.
