NEWS MISCELLANY.

CLEANED FROM THE SUNDAY MAIL.

Mrs. Melville's Release.—A Queer Crank. Robbing an ex-governor. — Suicide of an Actor, and Other Items.

Mrs. Melville, the wife of the engineer of the Arctic ship Jeannette, who was placed in the Norristown insane hospital by her husband a few days after his arrival home, was released from the institution on Friday evening and is now at her home in Sharon Hill with her two youngest daughters, who have been with her during the period of her restraint. It became early manifest to the authorities of the hospital that although at the time of her admission Mrs. Melville, according to the certificate of two physicians, was suffering from the nervous effects of alcoholic preparations and was a subject for treatment in such a hospital, she was different from the other patients. They accordingly allowed her to spend her time as she pleased with her children and permitted her to leave the institution whenever she wanted to, under parole to return the same day. She treated her honor paroles with inviolable sacredness and won the good opinion of everyone around the institution. "Very quietly some of the lady's friends took the necessary preliminary measures and had a commission in lunacy appointed to examine into her case. A careful inquiry was made and the decision arrived at that she was not a fit subject for such an institution. She was accordingly released and, looking quite happy, drove home in a carriage with her little ones. Engineer Melville, by the advice of his friends, has made some temporary provision for her support. Mr. Melville has removed the oldest daughter, Maud, to Brooklyn.

A QUEER CRANK.

What He Told Some of the Deputies of United States Marshal Banks.

A unique specimen of the genus crank was sent to proper quarters by United States officers in Boston. General Banks United States marshal, was notified by a secret service bureau that the following dispatch had been received by the secretary of the treasury:

WOODBURN, Mass., Nov. 17, 1882. Have a United States marshal meet me at United States hotel, Boston, between 9 and 10 a. m. on Friday, or Saturday. I shall wear a dark suit, celluloid collar and red necktie.

ROBBING AN EX-GOVERNOR.

Ransacking the House for Money and Then Particulars of the robbery of the residence of Ex-Governor Cochran, near Middletown, Delaware, show that the thief, after trying several windows, effected an entrance by prying open a parlor shutter. The noise of the breaking of the shutter caused the family to start, and hearing no further noise he fell asleep. About two o'clock, however, Mrs. Cochran was awakened by a slight noise in an adjoining room and saw the flash of a light through an open door. She called out, when the light disappeared and retreating footsteps were heard. She thought perhaps it was a visitor in the house who had spoken of arising early to see the comet, but yet felt all was not right. She feared to call the governor, whom she knew was unarmed, lest he might be injured were burglars found. When the family arose they found the whole house had been ransacked, but only some table linen, a counterpane, a dozen silver-spoons and a gold pen were taken, proving that the thief was evidently an amateur and on the look-out for money.

In the dining room it was found that an attempt had been made to set fire to the building, but the flames had evidently gone out for want of draught to keep them alive. Some dried grasses over the looking-glass were ignited, dropping upon a table covered with books and a desk, which was partly destroyed. A strange and inexplicable mystery in the locality lately is suspected of the robbery.

AN ACTOR'S SUICIDE.

Unable to Provide for His Wife and Dependents because of Financial Troubles.

A young man named Harry Ellis, a variety actor, committed suicide at the Empire house, in Cleveland, by taking morphine. This is the second attempt at self-destruction. Ellis was married in July last to a very pretty young lady living in Medina, Ohio. He told her he was able to provide for her and because he deceived her she left him and went home to her mother. Before she did so, however, about the middle of September, becoming despondent because of financial embarrassment, he swallowed a dose of morphine. He took too much, however, and it did not prove fatal. He recovered, and after a time joined a traveling company, his wife going home to her mother. He visited her and tried to induce her to accompany him. She refused, and he told her she should never see him again. Going to Cleveland he took a room in the Empire house and retired in excellent spirits. He was found dead a package of morphine in his pocket telling the tale. His wife went to the city Saturday night. She says he always treated her kindly, but her mother provided for her better than he did. She says she did not believe he would carry his threat into execution.

DEMOCRATIC JUBILEES.

A Salt River Parade in Reading and a Big Parade in Harrisburg.

About one thousand enthusiastic Democrats took part in a Salt river parade in Reading Saturday night. The keynotes club and nearly all the organizations in the city participated. Jerry Sullivan was chief marshal. The American club and Democratic club association did not take part. The streets were jammed with people. A feature of the parade was a delegation of "Mos and Co." at which in gorgeous costumes. Mike McCullough, ex-member of the Legislature, was at the head of this party. About twenty large wagons, containing persons attired in all kinds of fantastic costumes, brought up the rear. On one there was a large cannon which was fired off at intervals. A high-sized elephant, stuffed with straw, weighing one thousand four hundred pounds and lying on his back, was drawn by four horses. The streets were illuminated all along the route. A meeting had also been

arranged, but Senator Gordon, of Philadelphia, telegraphed that he could not come and this was dropped.

In Harrisburg the Democrats celebrated by a large and enthusiastic procession. There was a general illumination along the line of parade.
