PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 1.—Chief Commissioner of Highways William Baldwin, died suddenly shortly before ten o'clock this morning. He walked from home to attend the opening meeting of city councils, accompanied by his brother and one of the select councilmen. On the way over he complained of feeling unwell, but continued his journey until he reached a tobacco store on Sixth street above Chestnut, which he entered and sat on Chestnut, which he entered and sat on a chair ; his head dropping on his breast He was unable to speak and seemed to be unconscious. Messengers were sent for physicians, and in the meantime Mr. Baldwin was laid on his back on some boxes. When a doctor arrived he pronounced Mr. Baldwin dead. The cause of his death is supposed to be heart dis

An election for a successor to Mr Baldwin was to have been held by city councils this morning. Baldwin was a candidate for reelection, but he was opposed by the Committee of One Hundred and the reform element in councils, and his defeat was conceded by some of his friends. It is supposed that his death was caused by undue excitement. Councils, which were about going into session, postponed the subject and eulogies upon the dead commissioner were pro nounced, after which both branches o city councils adjourned out of respect to the deceased.
