REPORM IN EARNEST.

The Work Begun at Harrisburg. Special Dispatch to the Intelligencer. HARRISBURG, Jan. 10, 1883.—The House Democratic caucus this morning gave a practical exhibition of reform by passing a resolution deferring the election of the following officers for thirty days: Two assistant sergeants-at-arms, two assistant deorkeepers, two assistant messengers, five pasters and folders, janitor of basement and janitor of washroom-thirteen in all, making a saving of about twelve thousand dollars. At the end of thirty days, if it is found that the work cannot be done without them, then the House will elect. No one has the least

idea that they will be needed. Some of the members of the caucus thought J. MacDowell Sharpe was going pretty far when he got up and announced that he had been looking into the postage and stationery acts, and was convinced that the act of 1870 allowing members \$100 for postage stamps was repealed by the act of 1879, which gave the members \$50 for stationery and all perquisites

whatever. A discussion as to the word "perquisites' ensued, Sharpo claiming that it covered postage stamps, and Amerman and Furth maintained that it did not, that postage stamps are a necessity, in order to permit of the mailing of valuable public documents to the people. The matter was finally settled by appointing American, Sharpe and Hines a committee to investigate the matter.

It has been the invariable custom for Republican clerks to issue these postal orders at the opening of the session, and for members to hurry off and get them cashed, often discounting them in order to get \$97 or even \$95 in ready money, instead of the postage stamps. Chief Clerk Meek had issued a number of them the other day when his attention was called to the questionable legality of the allowance, and he at once ceased their further issue, and stopped payment on all not yet cashed until the matter is finally determined.
