A RAILROAD WAR.

A Lively Contest in Western Pennsylvania, N. Y. Times.

The Sharpville railroad is a little line in Mercer county, but it is a valuable property, tapping extensive coal fields and is a feeder of considerable importance to the through lines. For a long time the Erie and Pittsburgh company had a monopoly of the coal trade from the Sharpville road and made a good thing of it. So plump was the plum that the desire to possess it broke up the happy family arrangement that had existed among the stockholders, and two factions, each wealthy and determined, were formed. At the head of one was William L. Scott, the well-known capitalist of Erie. The other side was led by Walter Pierce, the representative of large financial interests. Mr. Scott is the proprietor of large docks at Erie and Girard and he wanted the Erie and Pittsburgh to carry the Sharpville coal to these docks. The Pierce faction, on the other hand, were opposed to the Erie and Pittsburgh and threw the coal to the New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio, and the Lake Shore. With this state of affairs the annual election was held on Wednesday last. The capital stock of the Sharpville road is divided into 7,000 shares. Of these the Pierce faction held 3,500 shares, but 416 of them had been transferred within sixty days before the election and could not be voted. The Scott faction mustered 3,500 shares, but they had the judges of election on their side, and that is an important factor in any question of a judicial nature arises. The Pierce men, knowing that they would be outvoted, although really owning a majority of the stock, determined to adopt the cumulative plan, so instead of putting up six candidates for directors, they cast a cumulative ballot for men. The Scott men never dreamed of this. The Pierce men cast a straight ballot. The Pierce men, with their cumulative vote, knocked the permissives, but the tellers were men who wore the Scott badge, and they decided that the cumulative plan was not legal. The Pierce men were accordingly thrown out and the Scott board declared elected. The Pierce men had no idea of submitting, and as soon as the election was over the four candidates met and organized as the board of directors of the Sharpville railroad. The two vacancies in the board were filled, and immediate steps taken to bring the powers of the law to bear opposition. Application was made before Judge McDermott, of Mercer county, for a mandamus upon the tellers of the election to show cause why the vote for the Pierce party should be counted. The mandamus was granted and the Scott dynasty with out delay got out and the Pierce men took possession of the road, Wallace Pierce assuming the position of general manager. While the Scott men did not make any fight, it does not follow that the trouble is over. On the contrary, it has not begun. When the tellers of the election refused to recognize the cumulative vote of the Pierce men they acted upon the conviction of the Scott men that that plan, while sanctioned by the court, is not legal. Upon this line the Scott fight will be made, and without flinching any time upon the lower tribunals the case will be carried to the supreme court, where, once for all, the vexed question of cumulative voting can be brought to a final rest. There are many precedents that support the Pierce party, one instance occurring in this city, when Ralph Bagley, in 1881, voted his own and H. W. Oliver's stock, and elected himself director of the Pittsburgh & Lake Erie railroad getting his seat afterward without trouble. Other cases could be cited, but precedents will not count in this case. In plain black and white, it is a fight between the Pennsylvania railroad, backing Scott, and Vanderbilt, backing Pierce, and in a struggle between these rivals all the law of the land will be brought out, both in favor of and against the cumulative clause of the constitution of the state.
