Two More Hasty Students Hanged.

GALEWAY, Jan. 17.—Thomas Higgins and

Michael Ryan were hanged here this

morning for complicity in the murder

of the Huddeys. The public executioner,

Harwood, officiated. They both walked

firmly to the scaffold and died without a

struggle. Neither made a statement, but

during their confinement they expressed

repentance. But small interest was taken

in the execution and few persons were

present outside the jail.

Lord De La Warr's Portrait.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 17.—A portrait of

Thomas West, Lord De La Warr, was

formally presented to the city at noon

to-day, through Captain Clipperton, the

British consul. It is the gift of Mary C.

West, countess of Derby. The original

portrait is in possession of her family.

The picture is a fine oil painting, and

was taken in the year 1660, when the

Vice Consul Crump, Count Gail, John

Cook and others. The picture will be

placed in Independence hall.

The National Republican Committee.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The National

Republican committee met at the Arlington

hotel this morning. Mr. Jewell, of Con-

necticut, in the chair. The resignation

of Mr. Dousey, as secretary, was presented

and accepted, and Mr. Pierce, of Rhode

Island, was unanimously elected to that

position. The question of fixing a plan

Retusing the Payment of Bonds.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 17.—The

just resolution providing for the submis-

sion to the people of a constitutional

bonds was adopted by the Senate by a vote

of 39 to one. It will pass the House.
