Pruning Grape Vines.

Germantown Telegraph. Persons who did not prune their outdoor grape vines in November or December, can do it any time during February. The excised portions should be cut up into pieces from one foot to two feet in length, according as the buds might be best adapted to planting, tied into bundles of one or two dozens, and buried a few inches under the soil in a location whence the water would drain off, or under an open shed. After the vines are pruned, cut them loose from the trellis and allow them to sprawl over the ground, in which position they will stand severe weather much better than if left fastened to the trellis. In fact half-hardy vines can be saved sometimes by this arrangement, as it is much warmer on than above the ground. Besides, the snow will protect them. But there is another advantage that is not always thought of, which is that this horizontal position of the grape vines will cause them to sprout low down, almost to the ground, by which new, vigorous runners can always be supplied a matter of great importance to regular

Bees Now. Cor. Germantown Telegraph.

It will be well for those who keep their bees during the season of hibernation in cellars, or other places than the summer stands, to avail themselves of the first favorable day to bring them out and let them fly. Such a day needs to be sunny as well as warm for the best results. Ar old pasture lot or mown field is best to fly over, and for want of these a goodly amount of straw scattered about is bes for them to alight on and warm up and bask in the sun's rays. If there is much snow at such times the use of straw, as indicated, is very essential. for if a bee gets on the snow or ice, and especially if it is back down, as it is very sure to be, he is a "goner."

If bees get uneasy or restless, the sooner an opportunity is given them to fly the better. This uneasiness is easily known by putting one's car at the entrance of the hive. Such uneasiness is a bad sign, and the value of a colony showing it is pretty well discounted; and for this reason it best to prevent it if possible by keeping bees in as even a temperature surrounding the hive as possible, say 32 to 40 degrees Fahrenheit, in the dark, free from noise or bad odors; the quieter the better. With the best of surroundings, becs fre quently go through the winter and comout in the spring in very good shape with out flying during the winter. But it i better under all circumstances to give them a chance-one at least-during the winter to fly. Oftener than once or twice is not desirable, as it serves to declimate the colony, and takes more food for their support.
