They also pass round the table with such vegetables or table luxuries as are not served individually. The table is tastefully dress ed with flowers and deserts, in which case the cloth is not removed. Great display is never indicative of anything but shod diness. Good taste suggests simplicity and a harmony of surroundings and circumstances. Insufficiency of light, turn ing off part of the burners, making the dining room fire just before the company enter, and allowing it to go out before their departure, is certainly a sign of economy, but may be instrumental in giving the host a sordid reputation.
