OVER-CREDULOUS METHODISTS.

What Bishop Simpson Says of the Isabella Silver Mining Company.

There has just come to light an ingeni ous mining scheme, in which, by various devices, hundreds of members of the Methodist Episcopal church have been defrauded. The device which had the greatest weight was an arrangement whereby Bishop Simpson was induced to subscribe to the stock and the act made to appear an indorsement of the scheme principally by an editorial in the Christian Adoocate, the organ of the church, whose editor at that time, the Rev. Dr. Fowier. who was financially interested in the en terprise, has since explained was written during his absence, "Colonel" H. G. Bixby, an old California mining speculator who assured the reverend victims at the start that he was "a bard nut" and hi since given them substantial proof of his veracity, was the author and reaped the harvest. A worthless affair known as "The Isabella Silver mining company; capital \$10,000,000," was the basis of operations, Colonel Bixby offer ed to endow the Methodist Epis e gal University at Athens, Tetm., with \$300,000 in mining stock, pro viding the good Methodists of the country raised \$100,000 or so to get the mine in working order. Professor L. B. Caldwell. the chemist and mineralogist of the university, a very religious man, with abundant confidence in human nature, went out and saw the property, made selections of ore, had it assayed and came East, declaring enthuslistically that it was the richest property in California He now says that the lay-out was "crooked," as it is technically termed, the good ore having been spread over the worthless property. At the solicitation of the Rev. Dr. Spence, the president of the university, and Professor Laldwell Bishop Simpson contributed \$60.

BURIED BENEA TH COAL. A Fatal Accident Which Beielt Som e Mines

A severe accident occurred Wednesday afternoon at L. A. Riley & Co.'s Logan colliery, near Ashland, by which a number of miners were fatally injured. The breasts and shutes were full of coal, which gave the miners a half hour's idle time. Two Polanders, named Joseph Sevistowski and Teolpen Miscataiex, were engaged in skipping pillars and David Williams, William and Martin Groskeki, brothers, were working in the adjoining breasts. The last mentioned three went over and joined the other two in friendly conversation, and without a moment's warning the wing of coal hanging over head gave away, causing several tons of coal to fall, almost burying the five men. Some time was occupied in releasing them from their imprisonment. Teolpen Miscataiex was frightfully cut and lacerated and has since died. The bodies of the others are so terribly cut and bruised by the huges lumps of coal falling on them that, should they live, they will be crip pled for life. King Leopold, of Belgium, Contesting in new York for Storen Securities. Canon Bernard, a Roman Catholic dignitary in Belgium, came to this country over a year ago with \$700,000 worth of securities and was captured in Mexico by a New York detective. He had the securities with him. He was sent back to Belgium and the securities turned over to Sheriff Rowe for safe keeping. King Leopold II., of Belgium, and the bishop of the Belgian church both brought suit for the securities. The sheriff summoned a special jury to pass upon the disputed question of title. Wednesday, while engaged in their labors, in New York, they were served with an order from Judge Donohus to show cause why they should not be restrained from further action until April. This order was obtained in behalf of King Leopold. One of his counsel said to-day "The king says the title of the securities cannot be settled without the production of certain material proof which will have to be brought here from abroad.
