### CHICKEN FEFD.

The Way to Raise Poultry. A correspondent of the Country Gentleman, after forty years' experience in feed ing chickens, has found nothing so good in the morning as corn and oats ground together and wheat bran. These two kinds of meal must be mixed into a stiff dough with boiling hot water. For about seventy-five Brahmas, mix, when the weather is very cold, six quarts; put in one teaspoonful of salt, and three or four times a week put in as much red pepper as you can put on the point of a pocket knife blade, or say as much as a snuff taker would take in two pinches. Give this as early in the morning as the chickens come of the roost. For dinner give three or four quarts of whole corn and outs mixed, or buckwheat instead of oats in winter. In summer they do not need any noon feeding. For the last meal at night give as much whole, corn and scraps as they will cat. Always keep broken oyster shells and dry ashes or gravel where the chickens can get to Ely's Cream Balm Co. little finger into the control of the chickens can get to wel where the chickens can get them. For green food give anything you may bave, such as cabbage, turnips cut up fine, or anything of this kind. Turnips and potatoes boiled and mashed at the morning feeding are excellent. If you add these you do not require so much meal. Give the mash in the morning as hot as they can cat it; if you can put your finger into it without pain, you need not fear to give it to the chickens. Any kind of cooked food, such as is left from the table bits of meat, potatoes, all kinds of vere tables-in fact, almost anything which i cooked for human beings, is good for chickens. Chickens must not be over fed if they are, they will not produce many eggs. The best rule to follow in feeding is to give no more than they will cat up clean, without stopping to go away and come back. Chickens fed in this manner and kept in a dry place (not too close: better wide open than closed up so that there is not free circulation of air) will
