GRAFTING

Some Timely Bluts on the Subject.

Germantown Telegraph. The season will soon open when grafting fruit trees may be commenced, and those who have any grafting to be done, and are not up to doing the work themselves should look around for some capable person to do it for them; and it should be disposed of at as early a day as possible, or out door farm labor will start with a rush and the comparatively trifling a thing as grafting will be fergotten until it has become too late to be attended to, and has to be passed over with the thought that it will do just as well to be attended to next year, when it shall be done without fail, There is always somebody to be found who understands grafting and who will do all one has to do in half a day, at a charge of from two to four cents per graft. In providing the grafts it is better for each one to obtain from neighbors. who will or ought to give away the grafts they have to spare, as we have done for about forty years, having cut them and stuck them in the ground a couple of inches at the foot of each tree, in order that while they will be perfectly preserved in this way there will be no mistake as to

As we have more than once suggested, every farmer and gardener ought to be capable of doing his own grafting. When once understood, there is nothing more simple or easy. A quarter of an hour spont in observing any good grafter at work ought to be long enough to instruct how it is done and to do it. In order that those who may desire to attend to their own grafting may possess the best information we can offer them on the general subject, we will repeat what our own experience enables us to communicate. Stocks or limbs to be grafted, not over two inches in diameter, should be cut off at the distance of four inches. A fine saw should be used. Incline the saw so that the stump, if perpendicular, will shed the rain. The bark must be unin jured. With a sharp knife smooth off the sawed stump. Take a case knife, which is as good as any, place it across the heart of the stock, and force it down with a wooden mallet. We use a very narrow screw driver for keeping open the split. Shape the scion wedge fashion both ways. keeping the bark intact. We make a shoulder as far up as the scion is shaved which though not so strong, better insures growth. The inside of the back of both scion and stock should meet or cross, in order that the sap of the two may com mingle. Set the scion at a slight angle spreading from each other. When the stock is small and only one scion inserted, place a piece of wood on the opposite side of corresponding thickness. If the stit does not close up sufficiently, tie round a cotton string to keep it tight upon the graft. Cover with wax every part of the cut and slit. In three weeks' time go over the grafts and rewax if needed. It is air and rain getting in that destroy. Where the limb to be grafted is from two to four inches over, it should be cut say six inches from the tree, and from four to six scions may be inserted. When there is only grafting to be done

on one's own premises we make the wax, as we have often published it, and as we have used it upon our own premises for some forty years as follows: Four parts of rosin, one part of beeswax, and one part of beef tallow. Melt them together in a skillet (which is the best,) or a tiucup and stit well. It should remain in the vessel and use as needed. Apply with a light wooden paddle or spatula. Twenty or thirty scions can be waxed with one warming up. When much grafting is to be done a little fire for heating the wax should be made between two bricks or stones.

KILLED BY A GRINDSTONE.

Seven Grindstones Burst in a Nail Factory. A frightful accident occurred at the Mingo iron works, south of Steubenville, Ohio, Thursday night. A railroad accident having occurred near the works, the engineer left the mill to view the wreck, and while absent the governor belt flew off giving an increased speed to the grindstones. A boy ran to the engine, when one of the stones broke, flying over the heads of the natiers and making a large hole in the mill. The boy ran away and the men attempted to escape, while seven of the mammoth stones flew into fragments, one after another, until the seventh stone broke, striking the steam pipe and knocking a large hole in it and thus stop ping the engine. The men were terribly frightened. Captain James II. Prentice was struck and instantly killed, and a young man named William Pert, of Penwood, was slightly injured. The loss to the mill owners will amount to several thousand dollars and will cause a stoppage of the works for some time.
