THE STORY OF THE DUBLIN MURDERS the Informer Relates the Tragedy-Preparations For the Crime-The Pris-

oners Dejected.

In the progress of the trials at Dublin on Saturday the informer, Carey, testified that he had joined the Fenian Broth erhood in 1862, and that he had always been the treasurer of its funds, which were in a bad state. "Because you pocketed them," interrupted one of the witnesses. During his connection with the society several persons were tried by a court martial of the organization. Up to 1879 informers only were tried. Edward McCaffrey was, prior to November, 1881, a member of the organization. In that mouth he brought Walsh to Carey's house. Walsh, who was from the North of England, told Carey that his mission in Dub lin was to make history. The names of four persons had been submitted to the organization in London as capable of heading the organization in Dublin. Among those names was his own. Walsh had sworn him in, each holding a knife in his hand. The oath bound Carey to obey all orders transmitted to him by the Irish Invincibles, under the penalty of death.

A few days afterward Walsh, McCaffrey and James Mullett told him that they were to form a board of directors of a new organization in Dublin of Invincibles, who were not to exceed 250 members for

the whole kingdom. There were to be selected from picked and its object was to "remove" all ty-rants. James Mullett, who established the society for the Extirpation of Tyrants, was to be chairman, and Mr. Forster and Earl Cowper were named among those to be removed. Relative to the further operations of the Dublin branch, it was to be left to his own discretion. gave the witness \$50. Mr. Burke's name was subsequently mentioned among them-

Preparing for Assassination. Arrangements were made for taking the house at Cork Hill, close to Dublin Castle, from which Earl Cowper was to be shot. Early in December the witness went to Phonix Park with Curley, and there met Mullett and Walsh, who were watch. ing the chief secretary's house. The witness saw the brothers of Mr. Forster and Burke coming out. The four principals in the month of December selected men for the work in Dublin. The witness selected a man named Leonard and Stephen, the last named being an American. McCaffrey selected Doyle. The greater number of men were selected by Invincibles numbered about thirty.

In December, 1881, he (Carey) was introduced at the Augel hotel Sheridan, who was disguised as a priest, and passed by the name of Father Murphy. Sheridan told him that he was extending the society and Invincibles throughout the country, and promised to send him some weapons from London.

The society watched days and nights to murder Mr. Forster. On one occasion he escaped by waiting aboard a steamer at Kingston. They waited for him until the last railway train had left. He recollected the shooting of MacMahon. Previous to the shooting of MacMahon. Previous to that time an arrangement had been made to remove Mr. Forster at the corner of

HEAVY SUITS, himself were Leonard, MacMabon, Drawy, Kelly, Curley and Martin. He, Carey, gave the signal when Mr. Forster passed. John street, on his way to the castle. A by Fitzgerald's cab, according to the arrangement, but the plan failed through the negligence of a watcher named Rowley. Curley reprimanded Rowley, and watched for Mr. Forster on his return from the castle, but this time there was a failure on the part of the signal cab. On three other occasions the murder of

Mr. Forster was prevented by the acci dental passing of a party of mounted police. Carey testified that he himself suggested the use of knives, and McCaf ferty directed them to wind cords around the handles to strengthen their grip Frank Byrne was a member of the confederation, and his wife brought at one time six knives, and at another four and a rifle, concealed under her cloak. Curley became chairman after Mullett's arrest, and Bradley succeeded Curley in the council. The murders of Forster and Burke were

discussed at Mullett's house. McCafferty's successor was known only as "No. 1," and was evidently a military man. He always gave the money and "said there was no limit. They could have £1,000 if they wished." The conspirators often talked among themselves as to the source of the money. Some thought it came from America, but Carey himself thought it came from the Land

Planning the Park Murder. On the night Mr. Forster left Ireland, fifteen Invincibles actually followed him to the Westland Row station. Curley ooked into the cars, but only saw Mr. Forster's wife and daughter. The fifteen Invincibles were under the command of Curley on this occasion, who was obeying the orders of the mysterious "No. 1." Mr. Forster had definitely left Ireland, they were told to concentrate their atten-tion upon Mr. Burke. Carey went to the Park on May 5. Fitzharris met "No. 1" opposite the Vice Regal Lodge. There were also there Patrick Delaney, Tom McCaffrey, Cusley, Brady, Smith and Kavanagh, for the purpose of meeting Mr. Burke and "removing" him. On this occasion Mr. Burke accidentally escaped by taking an unusual route. All the conspirators on the 6th of May met in or about the Royal Oak tavern, except Mullett, who was in prison. There were also two men named Dwyer, one of whom has gone to America. On the morning of May 6th he (Carey) met Smith, a laborer, employed about the Castle, and who knew Mr. Burke's appearance. Kavanagh's testimony was confirmed by the witness regarding the car being at Wren's public house, with Brady, Keely, McCaffrey and Delaney. Carey took his two little children with him in the cab early on the 7th of May, when he went to the park, and was accompanied by Joseph Hanlon and Smith.

Amid breathless silence, Carey then related how he saw the seven conspirators meet Lord Cavendish and Secretary Burke. Curley, Haulon and Fagan went first, Brady and Kelley followed, and McCaffrey and Delaney came after. Curley told him to tell Smith to "go to hell out of this," and the murderers then held a council. He asked Brady what he should do and was told to go off. Before going he said: "Mind and be sure it is the man in the gray suit." He timed his movements accurately during the day, and what happened in the park was at 7:1? p. m. As he went off toward Island Bridge the victims were 200 yards away, and on the bridge he met Smith, who was acquainted with Burke's appearance, and had accompanied him for the purpose of pointing him out. It was Smith who told Kavanagh to burry up and take the nose bag off the horse. Carey declared that Smith did not know what he was wanted

for, and that he said this to save an inno-

cent man.

After the Murder. At the meeting at McCaffrey's house, Brady said: "Lord Frederick Cavendish when he spoke, struck me with an umbrella. I then made at him. He held up his arm and I struck it. He then ran into the road." He also said that he struck Mr. Burke, first in the left shoulder. The other gentleman came up and called him a ruffian. He rap after him and settled him. He then looked around and saw Kelly coming away from Burke's body, and he and Brady went and cut Burke's throat. At the house Curley also told him (Carey) that he had at first feared there was going to be another failure, when he Fenians and the Dublin branch of the or-ganization was to consist of fifty members were armed. The cards read: "Executed by order of the Irish Invincibles."

Carey's evidence concluded with details oncerning the checks sent to the prison ers while incarcerated as "suspects" in Kilmainham jail by the sustenance fund committee of the Land League. Carey in June last handed to "No. 1" his resigna tion as one of the four leaders of the In-

vincibles. During the giving of the testimony relating to the murder Brady crouched relating to the murder Brady crouched down behind two of the other prisoners. The others appeared dejected, except James Mullett, who wore a defiant look. Before the adjournment of the court Carey formally identified all the prisoners. Several of them as they came forward called him a "perjured liar." Patrick likelyney who appeared wary ill said Curley and Mullett, the latter's principal Selection being Brady. By July, 1882, the Solemnly: "That is the man," pointing to Carey, "I may thank for all my misfortunes from childhood."
