International Electrical Exhibition. The Franklin Institute is arranging for an international electrical exhibition to be held in Philadelphia about a year from now. The exact time has not been fixed, though many managers of the institute are in favor of holding it in May or June 1884. The Vienna electrical exhibition will occur in August, September and October of the present year; as it will draw exhibits from all parts of the world it is thought advisable to allow several months to intervene between the two events. By this means the greater part of the articles exhibited at Vienna will be brought to this country. This is considered a good point, as many of the articles exhibited are manufactured expressly for that purpose, and the expense is so great that valuable articles would not be displayed at every fair if it was necessary to make new ones each time.

Within recent years the improvements in the application of electricity have been so numerous, and the force is applied to such a diversity of objects, that an extraordinary display is anticipated. It is the intention of the managers of the institute to include all kinds of machinery used in the generation of electricity, as well as all devices to which the current is adapted. In order to promote the objects of the exhibition and encourage foreign inventors and manufacturers to send displays the aid of Congress has been sought to suspend the tariff laws so far as they would compel the payment of duties on machinery and articles intended for the exhibition.
