The Grass Covered with Deep Snow and the Water with Thick Ice.

Ogden, Utah, Dispatch to the World. Telegrams and letters received here from over one hundred points in the principal regions of the cattle trade, in regard to the effect of the severe storms of the last two weeks on the immense cattle in

terests of the West, give an aggregate loss of nearly, \$2,000,000.

The intense, old that has just passed

has not been equaled before in January for many years. All through the great valley of Salt Lake in Utah, which has an average elevation of 4,290 feet, the mercury reached a minimum of 15 to 30 below zero. In Wyoming, Idaho and Celorado, where the elevation is much greater, the cold was proportionately more severe. For three days along the Oregon short line which runs from Granger on the Union Pacific northwest into Idaho, the spirit thermometers indicated 16 below zero. A

number of parsuns were frozen to death and a large to a in live stock interests re-The stockman in Nebraska and houses telegraph that, while the cattle have thus far been in fine condition, the great depth of snow fall will cause an namense loss unless an unexpected thaw should occur to bare the hillsides and fur nish bot' grass and water. Sheep require constant care and watching, and unless sheltered in corrals at night will frequently perish en masse in a snow storm. Cattle on the contrary, are hardy and accustomed to rough it for themselves. Two years ago, during a month of intense cold, the great bulk of cattle which saved their lives drifted before severe storms from the north all the way from northern Colerado and southwestern Nebraska to the region of the Arkansas river, some going as far south as the Indian territory. Last winter all herds remained on their ranges, the occasional cold snaps causing no movement among them. Telegrams from Eastern Colorado and

Western Kansas state that a large stampede occurred there among the cattle, extent not known. One heard, numbering thousands, passed to the south of Denver, head-d for the mountains. Among them were some of the celebrated Hiff brand, whose range is 100 m:les away, which distance they have traveled since the beginning of the cold snap. If the cold is protracted they will proceed south to a warmer climate; if the weather moderates and remains pleasant they will return to their respective ranges. The cattle in all parts of Colorado are fat and had au abundance of grass up to the present fall of 'snow. Several stockmen telegraph: "Cattle fat enough to stand three weeks of cold weather without food," Letters from Teller and other points in the north and middle parks of Colorado state that the cattle are suffering from the lack of water, the streams having frozen during the cold snap, and that there is not suffi cient snow to moisten the feed.

In the Bitter Creek country the 'oss of sheep is very large. Cattle drifted badly during the storms and ranchmen have not as yet ascertained the amount of damages to their respective herds, which may aggregate more than expected. Advices from the Medicine Bow region state that while grazing spots have been left by the drifting of the snow the cattle have suffered from the intense cold. A letter from a cattle man in Chevenne says: "In this vicinity and for miles in every direction the outlook is the darkest. The snow ics on a level to the depth of from 10 to 25 inches in an unbroken waste. The cattle on all this vast range cannot obtain a morsel of grass and there is not any immediate prospect of their chances being bettered."

From Snake, Beat and White rivers, in southern Wyoming and northern Colorado, similar reports are received. The cold was very great, 35 and 40 below zero. No coaches are running, the mails being taken in on horseback, the snow on the divides being as great as five feet in depth. Considerable loss to stock is expected.

Large numbers of cattle have been killed along the Union Pacific, at Point of Rocks and many other places, for which the railroad pays damages. The aggre gate has become so large that special orders have been issued to all trains to lose time in preference to killing any more stock.
