The sweets of all the spring and summer months, the sugary saps, with their indescribable flavors, cannot escape through the warm embers. The mellowness, the aroma, the essence, that escape you in apple blooms and clover blossoms, are held in the roasted yam to be precipitated against your expectant palate.

There was an absurd discussion in a Northern paper some time ago as to whether the possum should be baked or barbeoued, and as to whether it should be served hot or cold. The humblest negro in the land would settle the controversy stantly by saying that possum is "good any way you fix him." The Georgia pumpkin yam is good, no matter how it is not or cold.
