

Several persons had a narrow escape from a fire at 18 Rose street, New York, on Saturday. The flames cut off exit by the elevator shaft and stairs, and occupants ascended to the roof and from there passed to adjoining buildings. The building is brick, five stories high, about 25 feet front and 75 feet deep. It narrows to 14 feet in the rear. It is the first building north of the bridge. The first and second floors and the basement were occupied by Finch & Swan dealers in lubricating oils. The American rubber paint company, E. Blunt proprietor, occupied the third floor, and the fourth and fifth floors were occupied by Dick & Stetcher, publishers of song books. Sixteen girls worked on the top floor at coloring the E. J. Stecher, his son and three employees.

Imao Cohen, of 235 East Seventy-ninth street, the engineer, was in the basement. The elevator was at the Rose street doorway. There was a large quantity of oil on the lower floors, paint on the third floor. The fire broke out soon after 1 o'clock in the basement near the engine room. The oil firm's employees had no difficulty in escaping. Cohen jumped on to the elevator, ran it up to the fourth floor, and gave the alarm. The smoke followed him up the elevator, and filled the upper floors. Mr. Stecher and his employees hastened to the roof by means of the scuttle. A wooden stairway ran from the roof to the top of 216 William street. Some of the girls fainted on the stairway, and men from adjacent houses carried them down the scuttle. The girls who were the last to get out were nearly suffocated by the smoke. Eight went down through 216 William street, and eight crawled over its sloping roof to 22 Rose street. They lost all their outer clothing. Mr. Stecher left even the money which he was about to pay to his hands.

Cohen did not follow in the flight to the roof. He ran back to the elevator, and the Stecher boy followed him. They descended through the burning smoke and tried to stop at the ground floor. They could not see and went half way into the basement, where the fire was raging furiously. In a moment the elevator ropes were burned away, and Cohen was terribly burned about the face and hands. The boy's hands were burned. Men heard their shouts for help, and kicked in the front door and dragged them from the elevator platform. James Bunting, on the third floor, was started by the smoke pouring in at the doorway. It was too dense to allow him to go up or down stairs, and he ran to the fire escape in the rear. He descended two stories, and jumped.

It was 3 o'clock before the flames were subdued. None of the walls fell. The building, which belonged to Charles Craze & Co., was damaged to the extent of \$7,000, and was fully insured. Mr. Stecher said his loss was \$24,000, partly insured. Mr. Blunt said his loss was \$5,000, insured for \$1,000. Finch & Swan's loss is estimated at \$15,000, fully insured. No. 20 Rose street was damaged to the extent of \$1,000 by water.

At the examination one week ago she was again promoted to the first class and her parents say she appeared to be in great terror of being again reduced. Last Monday she came home at noon, complained of a violent headache, but insisted on returning to school in the afternoon. That night she was taken ill and brain fever set in. During her delirium she continued for over forty-eight hours to calculate sums in arithmetic.
