dict-Proceedings of the Last Day, Dukes Hanged in Kingy. Uniontown Dispatch to the Times.

The town is running wild with excitement. To night the jury in the Dukes murder trial brought in a verdict of not guilty. The judge denounced the verdict and reprimanded the jurors. The men who did this thing are:

Alexander Jordan, laborer, aged 49.

Henry McIntyre, miner, 52. Elmer Cagey, farmer, 31. Hiram Balsley, carpenter, 40. Thomas Bamberger, miner, 39. William T. Clawson, wagon-maker, 56. George Washington, farmer, 52. Jacob Liston, farmer, 58. Lawrence L. Knotts, distiller, 49. Robert H. Acklin, blacksmith, 27.

These men are all Democrats. They are all married men and all have families. McIntyre, Clawson and Washington have grown up daughters. Not a man of them was for a verdict of murder. After the news had spread the greatest

indignation prevailed everywhere. Men are parading the streets making threats of lynching, and Dukes has sought the pro tection of the sheriff for the night. A public indignation meeting has been called.

Outside the narrow room in which the twelve men sworn to render a verdict by the evidence were gathered, under lock and key, there was but one sentiment as to what the verdict should be. When the prisoner was first arraigned and pleaded 'not guilty" so boldly, the feeling of the community was about evenly divided, but under the evidence, and especially the letters written by Dukes to Nutt, almost And you will have no sickness or suffering or doctor's bills to pay.

A Great Rush to Court. The sound of hurrying feet passed the word. The evening papers, with the last details of the trial, were flung upon the floor. Stores and shops were deserted. The late comers to the hotel supper tables infected with the excitement, dropped knife and fork and ran. The waiters dropped their napkins and ran after them. Before the first tap of the bell summoned those in the remoter quarters of the town the court house yard was a mass of people. The court room was jammed as it had never had been during the days of the trial. With one step upon the plat form by his desk Judge Wilson said, forebodingly: "I am afraid the verdict comes too quickly to be the right one."

If you have committed an error it is one that we cannot avoid, but can only express our condemnation of it in this mild way. The prisoner is discharged."

The crowd rushed out, but waited about the halls to see the acquitted man start out. He started down the back way, but remained concealed on the stairway while his counsel passed out the other way, and the crowd, seeing him go, in a nation at the verdict ran high. The effigy idea took like wildfire with the angry people, who were seeking some means of expressing their disapproval of the verdict. By ten o'clock effigies were hanging from the lamp-posts in all parts of the town.

giving expression to their feelings in another way. A paper was rapidly circulated, calling an indignation meeting of all who are jealous of the reputation of Fayette county. It was hurriedly signed and will be posted through the town and neighborhood. It reads as follows:

"Indignation Meeting—Citizens of Fayette county, who are in favor of sustaining the character of the county before the civilized world, are invited to assemble at Post Office Corner. Uniontown, at seven Post Office Corner, Uniontown, at seven o'clock p. m. on Thursday, 12th instant, to express their indignation at the outrageous verdict acquitting the assassin of Captain A. C. Nutt. Let the world know that the law abiding citizens of this county are shocked and horrified and their feelings outraged by the verdict.'


