W. J. Paxson said the charge was not the same made before last conference. The wisest course would be to refer the matter to a committee.

Elder Hinson declared the charge precisely the same that was settled last year. He hoped it would not be entertained.

Mr. W. L. Gray, J. B. Dobbins, Pennel Coombe and S. W. Thomas argued on the same side. Messrs. Geo. Cummings and Jacob Todd

agreed with Paxson that the matter should be referred to a committee.

Elder Hinson said that the substance of this case was first tried in the civil courts, and the complainant failing there, this action was iuaugurated. gennel Coombe, then in charge of the church, called around him his official advisors-his stewards and trustees. Their united judgment was that no action should be taken. Then the matter was brought before the last con. ference. You know its action ; the conference tabled the committee's report recommending that the charges be entertained. Last year it was Brother Coombe that was in charge, this year Brother Pastorfield. Pastorfield had placed himself behind the action taken by conference. It is, therefore, impossible to censure him without censuring a majority of the conference. If we are ready to say that the last conference was a foolish one and thus

intoxicating liquors be submitted to the people. Henry Wheeler offered a series of reso-

lutions pledging the conference with its 50,000 membership to the support of such an amendment; and on motion Rev. Dr. D. C. Babcock, of the New Hampshire conference, was introduced and made an address in favor of prohibition.

A vote of thanks was unanimously tendered Col. Joseph M. Bennett for his late liberal donation of twenty acres of land for the use of the Methodist orphanage at Philadelphia.

The following named deacons having been examined and recommended to conference were by unanimous vote raised to the dignity of elders : George Gaul, Wm. H. Smith, W. H. Pickop, Thomas T. Mutchler, Cornelius Hudson.

The report of the tract society was pre sented and referred to the tract committee The report of the Seamen's aid society was presented and an eloquent appeal or its behalf was made by Rev. George W. MacLaughlin, its corresponding secre-tery, after which the report of the committee was unanimously adopted.

After the announcement of future meetings, conference adjourned.
