If she had strength to withstand the evil influence of such a pursuit, she is one of a thousand, and her testimony ought to be ald in honor when the vexed question of the moral influence of the stage is dis-

In her early study of the Bible lies the negret of Fanny Kemble's judgment of the profession, and her own noble preser-vation in spite of it and her surround-

That there are others in similar pursuits, like Abdiel, faithful where others fail, is not denied. But if there are many who have stood firm in the midst of danger and have declared their indebtedness to the Bible, I have not met with their names. These are Fanny Kemble's impressions of the Bible and of the stage. She owed much to the first, she despised the other.
