ad is fit in some warm and well altered spot. The tomate, if not in the to-door hotbed, should have been started the kitchen window, as we have already rised, and be enough for the small rden, for which these few random rears are made. After getting rid of directions we offered a few weeks ago owed. Then the early potatoes; but se should have been in the ground by Patrick's day, if the weather been fit; but this being out the question this year, they ould now be planted without delay. There are some other crops which, though bey are not particularly early, should be stended to as soon as the ground is in those. The outen is not partial to heat, and does all its growing in early spring. In the New England states and the North they mature in a single season, but here the seedlings soon dry up and have to be set out the following year to get their growth. The seed should not be sown too early in this latitude, or the sets will grow too large if the spring is cool and run to of forming the desired bulbs. Then there is the salsify and parsnip, which also need early sowing to mature fully, the former ally. Some parsley should also be carly at hand, and as it takes rather a long time to sprout, it should not be much de. layed in getting it into the ground. The okra comes later, and should be sowed in a dry and rather warm place.

By this time we have reached the beginning of April, and we must now begin to sow some things in readiness for the fall crops. Late cabbage and celery are especially of this class. These who are fond of lettuce now put in a second crop to run up to hot weather in the middle or latter part of June. When the ground gets to be pretty warm, we look after the bush bean, the beets, the early sweet corn, the squash, cucumbers, the melen family, preserving citron, followed by the ever popular lima bean.

We give these hints as mere reminde:s and are intended for the benefit of people with small gardens and expecially for young beginners. There are many other REAR OF CENTRAL MARKET HOUSES, small matters to be thought of as we progress in our little crops that will occur to us, and which we will avail ourselves of if we have the space and the time to give them a share of our attention. One more thing we would suggest is that there are several crops that should be repeated as the season moves along, in order that we may enjoy them through the summer, such as the delicious sweet corn, peas, the bush

Uncovering Strawberry Beds. The uncovering of strawberries should be attended to at once; in fact, when March is mild it ought to be done by the middle of the month. Unly the coarsest portion of the covering, with any lumps or old weeds, should be removed, and, where it is practicable, the ground slightly stirred. As soon in April as the soil will admit of it, the surplus plants should be taken out and transplanted temporarily, so that in case you are of a "frugal mind," they can be sold; otherwise, you can give them to friends. Setting out new strawberry beds is usually done in August, but there is nothing to hinder this work in the spring, say at the end of April or beginning of May, when it was neglected last fall, and it will be sure to give you a full crop the following year. Very ramthe plants being set from lifteen to eighteen inches apart and the rows at least two feet. The dwarfer varieties should be planted from twelve to fifteen inches each way and allowed to run together. We prefer the latter method as yielding the most and largest fruit, from the young plants always taking more or less the place of the old ones. A bed should be renewed about every three years; some people renew every two years ; but we have continued them for four to five years. It will all de-
