young trees when transplanted, or young trees out back for grafting, must have this work done early in spring before the buds have swellen a particle. Young cherry stocks have been kiled by grafting when the grafts did not grow, by being deprived of their entire foliage; and newly set trees have been ruined by cutting back too late in spring. In transplanting, the cherry requires reducing at the top as well other fruit trees, but it must be done moderately, and will not bear the operation after the buds have swelled. The season for gathering the eggs for

the coming broods is at hand. The fowls that are to produce them have long since been selected, or should have been, by the careful and judicious keeper. Eggs gathered while the fowls are in their first vigor are the best, giving stronger, heartier are the best, giving stronger, heartier chicks than those laid later in the season. Eggs that are strongly fertilized and pro-duced from healthy fowls will keep in good chicks, three weeks from the date of lay ing. They should be kept in a moderately warm place and be set up on end as soon as laid. This keeps the yelk from settling or adhering to the shell. These eggs should be doubly strong in the shell in order to withstand the rough usage they receive from the hen during the period of incubation. Little difficulty will be found in managing this if the fowls be of proper age and fed on food calculated to create healthful egg production. To have the eggs strong and perfect in

all respects the fowls should not lay too rapidly, for in this case the shells are not perfectly formed, and the eggs will not turn out so large a percentage of vigorous chicks. Uniformity is the thing to aim at in the raising of chickens. To secure this the laying fowls must possess great uniformity. Much depends on the breed, but for the majority it is better to use young, fully matured fowls. While the chicks from old fowls are stronger and better for stock birds, a smaller percent age of the eggs come out when used for hatching, and for this reason are not so desirable. Too many hens must not be allowed the cock. Fifteen, and sometimes twenty, hens may be allowed with good effect with the smaller fowls, while the Chehins and Brahmas with less activity should be allowed fewer hens.


