A Night Run of Cattle. Cincinnatt Commercial. Last fall a large herd of big steers for market were being driven across the coun try from Musselsbell to Billings, on the Northern Pacific railroad, where they were to be shipped on the cars for Chicago. There were 2,000 head, I should judge, the property of a Mr. De Hass, a very young man. One evening a military camp Lad been made just ahead of the cattle, and on the same side on which the herd was being driven. A storm was coming up and the cattle exhibited some signs of uneasiness. Mr. De Hass sent word to the military officer that he had better get his men, wagons and animals on the opposite side of the creek and out of the way, as he feared there was going to be a "night run." The herders were instructed to keep their horses saddled and be ready to mount at a moment's notice. The cattle were very uneasy, getting up, lying down again and shifting about. At last, about midnight, there came a sharp flash of lightning,

followed by a heavy peal of thunder, and in an instant the whole herd were upon their feet.
