FROM HARRISBURG. PROCEEDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE Activity In the Sepate-New Kills Introdu

-House Bills Reported-Bills Passed Finally.

Special Dispatch to the INTELLIGENCER. HARRISBURG, Pa, March 29.-In the Senate House bills were reported favorably to exempt the property on judgment obtained for \$50 or less for wages for manual labor and to authorize the governor to appoint a commissioner to devise means to prevent the polution of streams The following bills were introduced: By Hess, to encourage planting of trees over springs and along water courses; Kennedy, exempting building and loan associations from taxation and authoriz ing the loaning of money to parties not stockholders; Patton, to allow druggists, who are practical physicians, to dispense

spiritous liquors without a prescription. The following bills were passed finally Senate bill authorizing the publication of 29,000 copies of state agricultural reports House bill granting a gratuity of \$40 and annuity of \$120 to soldiers and widows of soldiers of the war of 1812; Senate bill granting a gratuity and annuity to Amanda Livingston, whose husband was shot and killed by an inmate of the Har-

risburg state lunatic hospital. The Senate agreed to adjourn to-morrow at 13 M. until Tuesday next, at 4 p m., over the first of April season.

The bill fixing the salaries of officers in Berks, Lancaster, Schuylkill and Luzerne counties was passed second reading, with an amendment increasing the salary of the district attorney and prothonotary from \$2,500 to \$3,000; clerks of orphans' court and clerk of quarter sessions from \$1,500 to \$2,000; register and recorder from \$2,000 to \$3,000; register and clerk of the orphan court from \$2,000 to \$3,500, and coroner from \$500 to \$1,000. These changes were made mainly at the instance of the senators from Luzerne and Schuyl kill counties.

House Proceedings. In the House the legislative apportionment bill was recommitted. The Senate bill abolishing the office of delinquent tax collector of Philadelphia passed second reading. The eight hour law was discussed for two hours without action; motion to indefinitely postpone was de feated—yeas 54, nays 113.
