AGAIN NO FASHION PLAY.

Captain Williams serves an injunction to restrain its production. Long before 8 o'clock last night the Temple in New York, in which Salmi Morse had advertised that he would produce the "Fashion Play," charging admission free, was thronged. A few minutes before 8 o'clock Captain Williams and Inspector Thorne, of the police, made their way to the back of the stage and there served upon Mr. Morse an injunction issued by the Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents, restraining the production of the play.

Mr. Morse sent for his counsel and on his arrival went before the court and in formed the audience of what had occurred. The announcement was received with hisses. Mr. Morse stated that the society had plenty of time to give the injunction, but had merely waited till the last moment before serving it. The money paid by those present would be returned in the morning. Counsel for Morse also made a speech, in which he denounced the proceedings as an outrage and a trampling on civil and religious liberty. The case was to have been given in aid of a home for poor children, but the society evidently objected to having poor children sheltered. The affidavit on which the injunction was granted was made by John J. Fitzgerald, and is to forth that the performance is a disgrace to religion and to be given in an unlicensed place. The hearing will be before Judge Donohue, April 11.

MR. TEVIS DIVORCED. Separated from his wife and granted the custody of his little daughter.

The sequel to the Tevis-Edgerton scandal at St. Louis came Tuesday, when a divorce was granted Rush Tevis, the injured husband, with custody of the four-year old daughter, the fruit of the union. Mrs. Tevis, it will be remembered, is the niece of General Sherman, who was surprised one night coming out of a respectable house with Frank Edgerton. The latter was shot by Tevis in the arm, and was killed terribly from pyramic shot. Mrs. Tevis left the city directly after her exposure and went to reside in Philadelphia. Tuesday, before the statements of Mr. Tevis and the detective who assisted him in shadowing his wife, another detective testified in going to Mrs. Tevis' residence on business some time last May. He was admitted by a servant girl, who and her mistress was upstairs. The detective went up to the door of Mrs. Tevis' bedroom and found Edgerton there, partially undressed, and Mrs. Tevis in a wrapper. Upon this testimony the divorce was granted. The parties were married in Philadelphia, January 3, 1878, and lived together until November 24, 1882.
