Philadelphia Times. The steamship Indiana, of the Americar line, which reached her wharf at noon yesterday, after a stormy passage of four-teen days from Liverpool, brought 69 evicted farmers from the counties Mayo and Galway, who boarded the steamer at Queenstown, driven from their homes by usurious landlords, and who came to this country mainly through the charity of one of the funds that has been raised in Great Britain and Ireland for the purpose of relieving cases of distress growing out of the land troubles. A Times reporter boarded the steamship before she reached her dock and found the immigrants huddled in groups on the forward part of the deck. They presented a pitiable picture of distress and most of them carried all their worldly effects in a sack or bundle. There were many children with the party. The health of the immigrants had been good during the voyage, the physician said, after the qualms of seasickness had passed

away. Nearly all of the steerage passen-

gers were vaccinated at sea...

No Mistaking Such Poverty. On the vessel was Rev. Bernard Skelly, from Galway, who has been sent out to this country by the arcbishop of Tuam to raise money for the relief of the prevailing distress in Ireland. He was accompanied by Brother Francis, a young friar who knew the districts from which these people come. The Rev. Mr. Skelly said: That these are genuine cases of distress needs no words from anybody to prove. Their condition tells their story. They chiefly belong to the class of small tenan try who sublet from others and subdivide their small bits of ground to the most attenuated limit. The land in both the counties they come from is as worthless and meagre in its character as any on the face of the globe. What is not rocky is mostly a barren bog. The soil that col-lects between the rocks and in the gullies of the hill sides is the best that is to be found. Of these people he is a large far mer who plants three hundred weight of corn. When the season is bad or this mea gre supply fails they have to rely almost exclusively on fish for food. In most cases if they lived on the land rent free they would be liable to be brought to the verge of starvation, but when they have to pay rent in addition there is no hope.' A Struggle for Existence.

"Among these people," explained Brother Francis, "one of the chief difficulties seems to be early marriage. For as the sons grow up the small plot of ground which the father works is divided among them. In this way a few generations cut the pieces of ground very small. In some instances a few hundred square yards are all that the family has to live off." The Rev. Mr. Skelly explained that the emigration had begun under the auspices of the society patronized by the Duchess of Marlborough, wife of the recent lord lieutenant of Ireland, who originally gave about £3,000, to which she has re cently added as much more. This party, the brother said, was assisted by this fund, but to what extent he did not know. The Miserables Ashore

With their boxes and bundles the

wretched creatures flocked over the side as soon as the gangway was put in position, and under the oversight of the customs officers ranged themselves along the dock to have their baggage examined and passed. In one place a group of women, with several children, squatted contentedly on the dirty wharf, gazing with eyes and mouths wide open at the strange sights of this new world. They were clad in garments of all cuts and colors, though the prevailing hue was a dull, dirty brown. The clothes of many were ragged and they apparently had seen neither soap nor water during the passage. Serted on a box together were two lads from the "ould sod," who looked as though they might have stepped out of a page of a comic al-manac. One of them had a bit of a round hat perched upon the top of his head : fringe of hair ornamenting his face, which looked like a full moop. In his mouth was stuck a "dudeen," which he sucked nervously, blowing clouds of smoke to hide his evident embarrassment, said he " Me name is Pat Comelly. I am from County Galway. I had a bit of laud and raised a few praties and had one little runt of a cow. I lived near the shore and used to go out on the wather and lish a bit with the other lads. The rains and cold weather rotted all me praties. M rint fell due and the auld cow had to be sold. Thin I lost heart and was took sick Whin I was tould that the agency would sind me over I was only too glad to come I am going to Bellair, Ohio. This is me chum, Tom Gaynor, sir; mebbe he can

tell you a bit of a sthory." " Will, sir, I'm from Connemara," said Thomas, " and worked for a small farmer. Whin the crops failed I had to go down to Galway to see if I could find imployment to kape meself from starving. Then I fill in wid the agent, who offered me passage to Ameriky, and here I am, and that's all of my sthory, excipt I am going to Pitts burgh.'

The steamer Nestorian arrived as Boston on Saturday night with 650 passengers, most of them evicted Irish tenants from counties of Galway, Mayo, Derry and Donegal, sent out by the British government. The British agent furnished money to those who desired to go to places be youd Boston, the amounts-depending on the size of the family-varying from a few shillings to five or six pounds The Par thia, from Liverpool, arrived yesterday morning with a large number of the same class of emigrants.
