OLD DERRY CHURCH.

An Effort Toward its Restoration Made by Descendants of Former Worshippers. Harrieburg Telegraph.

In the pleasant month of April, 1724, two Scotch Irish Presbyterian clergymen gathered whatever white settlers they could reach (all were there of their denomi nation) on a knoll, "near the Swatara creek in Chester county." The ancient county of Lancaster did not then exist. Proper religious ceremonies took place, and a congregation was founded, known for more than 150 years to the present day. as "Derry Church" near Hummelstown, in the present county of Dauphin. It has ever been a fountain of good men and women In the Revolution the sons of Derry were active, enthusiastic, brave. Not one held back at the call of his country. After Pennsylvania became a state the Legisla ture incorporated this congregation, originally with thirteen trustees, afterwards reduced to six. For many years the former number was not too great for the wants of the congregation. Then the "tempting West attracted attention." Thus it came about that almost in the centre of Ohio the men of Derry settled in force, carrying with the migration much of the religious and temporal strength of the church. These carried another and greater exodus after the peace of 1814, further depleting the con gregation. This was followed by care less management of the glebe, provision for the support of service was not to be obtained, and thus this church became extinct, and has so continued to be for about twenty years. Now it is preposed by many descendants of former worshippers and others to erect a new church and remove whatever of the present one is left at present an unsightly object as seen from the windows of passing trains on the Philadelphia & Reading railroad. A meeting to re-organize will be held at the shurch on Monday, April 23d, when measures will be matured to rebuild this waste place, one of the most ancient and reverend historic points in the state.
