STATE LEGISLATION.

PROCEEDINGS AT THE STATE CAPITAL The Recorder Bill Passed in the Senate-The Report of the Delany Investigation

Exonerates Him From Fraud. HARRISBURG, April 18 .- After a contest of over an hour, and the defeat of all efforts to amend the recorder bill, it was passed finally by a unanimous vote; the bill, as passed, repeals the recorder act of 1878, and provides that it shall go into effect on approval. The bill was amended in the Senate, and it will go back to the House for concurrence. The Report of the Delaney Investigation.

In the Senate Mr. Emery presented the Delaney report It exonerated him from complicity in frauds on the state, sets forth that the supplies for the Senate barber shop have been pro-cured in violation of the law and administers a rebuke rather to the Senate than to the Senate librarian, who purchased the supplies for the shop. Samuel Adams and his brother in law, Gray, are severely criticised, the former for venting his spleen on Delaney and the latter for furnishing 60 bars for 100 bars of soap to the state report. adjust difficulties between employer and employed came up in the House on second reading and consumed the entire time of the session. Ammerman opposed bill, holding it would not beneficial. Hines offered an amendment, that the bill apply to all trades of the commonwealth. Messrs. Taylor, of Clearfield; Hathorsall, of Philadelphia; Niles, of Crawford; Romig, of Philadelphia, and Robertson, of Alle-gheny, favored the bill; while Neill, of Philadelphia; Sponsler, of Perry, and McNamara, of Bedford, opposed the bill in its present shape. No action was taken on Hines' amendment, when Sponsler offered one, that the courts of common pleas have power to settle dispute, but it was not agreed to. Ammerman offered an amendment in sixth section to compel arbitration on the wages paid. Ormsby opposed it: "The bill, like others, was worthless and injurious; the law of supply and demand would regulate all such things." The amendment was not agreed to. Several other amendments were offered, but lost. An amendment in sec tion 10th, "That said umpire shall report in ten days," was adopted.
