THE TOBACCO MARKET.

IN NEW YORK AND LANCASTER.

Samatra, Seed Leaf and Havana for the Week Ending Saturday, April 21.

U. S. Tobacco Journal. Sumatra—The activity remains un-abated, though single sales have rarely been in parcels over 25 bales. Transac tions embracing 5 to 10 bales are the order of the day, and prices appear to be of little object when desirable stock is offered. Total sales are calculated to reach 400 bales, at prices ranging from \$1 to \$1.60. The enormous consignments which will arrive here before the increased duty goes into effect will tend to lower rather than to raise prices. The competition will be a sharp one, a large number of new firms having gone into the importation of this tobacco. A sale of some 10,000 bales new will take place at Amsterdam at or about

Seed Leaf-There has been rejoicing among packers of '82 Pennsylvania and sombre disgust among holders of '81 Pennsylvania. Large manfacturing firms were reported as having purchased 500 cases of '82 Pennsplvania from packers at big figures, while sales of several hundred cases of '81, at ridiculously low figures, were spoken of by brokers, partly with derision, partly with regret. These sales of '81 Pennsylvania, although reported by very nice people, as far as dress is concorned, smack somewhat of Barnumism and while we include the reported sales in our list below, we advise our readers to "take it all in" without extraordinary hurry. There are some fine ghost stories in the market about this '81 Pennsylvania. Heavy holders and their implements, generally consisting of curbstone brokers, are out with wagers that already manufacturers are using the '82 Pennsylvania; that by resweating it now and working it soon after, it beats Sumatra all hollow that Sumatra is bound to clear of the country as soon as this wonderful material is in spected by manufacturers. If our beautiful memory doesn't fail us, we recollect having heard exactly the same things said when '81 Pennsylvania was but half packed in cases; and we also have a faint idea that the holders of the '81 Pennsylvania would not hear of taking less than 25 cents for their tobacco, because it was as fine, and even a great deal finer, than Sumatra; and if the trade, and manufacturers especially, did not take it mighty

quickly they would raise the price at leisure and ad libitum. All this early talk and bragadoeio about new tobacco don't "pull" any more, nor are magnifacturers induced to pitch into a new crop in the hands of packers, merely because Tom, Dick or Yakoop report some prominent manufacturer as having been unable to withstand the attraction of this or that tobacco and in consequence invested largely therein. The fact of the matter is there is much too much tobacco of all kinds in the market; and as long as Sumatra can't be kept out of the country by a heavy import duty, no racing for tobac co on the part of manufacturers is necessary.

As regards the sales of '81 Pennsylvania reported, we notice that the heavy and strong holders continue stiff. Of course, the offers that are being made by prospective buyers are, when the investing figures of holders are taken into consideration, often so ridiculously out of proportion, that some very angry scenes that have taken place are spoken of. At one such seene last week, the saller denominated the prospective buyer a pickpocket. One can imagine the state of feeling hold ers of '81 Pennsylvania are in.

Sumatra is booming finely. New Richmonds, who are anxious to buy, appear on the field weekly. Price is considerable stiffer. Havana is looking up finely, especially A No. 1 stock, while Vuelta has the first call at improving fig. ures. Havanna wrappers are fast being
