The Arrest of Nevin, who is Alleged Have Deceived His Fellow Assassin A Threatening Letter Causing

Alarm in London DUBLIN, April 28.—Another arrest has been made in connection with the conspiracy to murder. The prisoner is a tailor named Nevin.

Who Nevin 1s. Nevin is the man who was mentioned vesterday by the informer Devine at the hearing of the conspirators, Kingston, Gibney and Healy, as having been appointed by the Fenians to find the hiding place of Pool, who had been condemned to death. Devine also stated that Nevin was afterwards charged by the assassins with deceiving them.

Men Who are "Wanted" Leaving Ireland. Dublin police have discovered that several men wanted for participation in he murder conspiracy have left Ireland. The police are in constant communication with the police of Manchester, Liverpool, New Castle and London touching the movements of suspected persons. More Arrests

FULLAMORE, Ireland, April 28 .- Three arrests in connection with the conspiracy to murder have been made here in consequence of information given at the examination of the three conspirators in Dublin, yesterday, by a man named Seery, a resi-dent of Tullamore.

The Guild Building Threatened. LONDON, April 28 .- An alarm has been caused by the receipt by the corporation of London of an anonymous letter warning that body that Guild Hall would be destroyed by dynamite on the 6th of May. A force of special police has been detailed to guard the building.

COUNTERFEITERS ARRESTED. A Gang Who Have their Headquarters in New York.

New York, April 28 .- One of the most extensive arrests of male and female counterfeiters was made last night and this morning by Chief Drummond of the treasury department and his force, assisted by the United States deputy marshal. The gang had its headquarters in this city and the chief has been working up their case since last August. The first person captured was George L. Stanley, the alleged manufacturer of counterfeit trade and Bland dollars. He fought desperately against the officers, but was over come and hand cuffed. Next to be taken in ustody were Matthias J. Rooney and Hugh Curry, who offered no resistance. These arrests were made on the street. Thomas Riley, Thomas H. Kearney and his reputed wife Lena, were arrested at their homes last night. Patrick Smith, Mrs. Jennie Holder, wife of Jim Holden, now in prison for passing counterfeit money, were arrested this morning at their dwellings. The two others were arraigned in court The two others were arraigned in court shortly afterward, when they were held for examination. Mrs. Rooney is charged with passing the bad money, so also is Smith, who admitted having shoved quite a lot of it in Baltimore. St. Louis, April 28 .- Texas dispatches say that a violent windstorm swept over the northwestern part of that state last night, doing much damage at Bor-ham, Palo Pinto and Belton. A number of houses were blown down, and in Bell county several persons are re ported to have been killed. A school house containing seventy children near Fort Worth was demolished, but only one child is reported to have been hurt.

Virginia Tobacco Operators to Strike. Lynchburg, Va., April 28 .- Another strike of tobacco operatives of this city is impending. Several hundred prizers and stemmers this morning made a demand for increased pay. If the tobacconists do not comply with the demand the operatives threaten to suspend

Delegates tioing Home. NEW YORK, April 28.-A number of delegates to the Irish convention from this city and the New England states arrived here from Philadelphia last night, but the main body of them reached here this morning. Excepting among the small dynamite faction, general satisfaction at the results of the convention is expressed.
