Beneficiary Students. Moravian.

The vexed question of beneficiary education is again agitating the minds, mouths and pens of many. While there are many and their number rather seems to be increasing, who denounce the whole system unqualifiedly, and would in no case have a theological student's education furnished him unless he pays for it just the same as medical, legal and other students must, there are others who maintain that the church that expects the future services of a young man ought to be willing to bear the expense of preparing him for such service. It appears to us that both parties are too sweeping in their declarations. There certainly is no obligation resting on the church to give a man his education simply because it expects his services afterwards. No man has a shadow of a right to claim his education on that ground. But, on the other hand, neither ought the church make a hard and fast rule to refuse any and everyone an education, unless he pays for it in money. To hold out the offer of a free education as an inducement, a sort of bribe for young men to enter the ministry, can certainly be only harmful. But to deny a young man the hope of giving himself to this work because he has not the money to educate him-self, would be harmful, too, in many a case. The matter is one that will not bear regulating by any iron clad rule, but must be determined according to the circumstances in each individual case, as is done in our church. If a young man is able to pay for his preparation for the ministry, oblige him to do so. Unwillingness on his part proves his unworthiness, the absence of a "call" in his case, the lack of thorough consecration. And if a young man, having all other qualifications, including a conscientious desire to preach the Gospel, has not the money, then by all means let the church educate him. The whole question is one for Christian love to determine, and not for unbouding rules.
