HER FACE WAS HER FORTUNE. Sought to Alleviate the Sufferings of Humanity.

In the death of Lydis Pinkham the country has lost one of its most familiar

and pervasive influences. She was better known than Susan B. Anthony, or the Sweet Singer of Michigan; and as can hardly be said of those two noted and perenuial characters, her face was her fortune. She gathered in \$300,000 a year, it is attated mainly on account of her picit is stated, mainly on account of her pictured visage-for it is quite safe to assume that, however meritorious her medicines may have been, it was her candid and benignant countenance looking forth from so many newspapers which persuaded people to buy. Without that picture the physic which it specified and commended would have been only as the thousand and one patent nostrums which the world never stops to notice; but with such a face framed in above the ordinary testimonials as a guarantee of good faith, there was no such thing as overlooking the fact or resisting the impression. Lydia seemed so guileless and compassionate, and her advertisement so surely touched some symptomatic point among the reader's miscellaneous internal discords. "There is a garden in her face,"

an old song, and a recent writer declares the expression to be a choice stroke on the part of the poet wishing to sum up what he saw in his lady's countenance, "inclusive of the roses, the lilies, and the cherries ripe." The face of the late lamented Lydia had this botanical quality -only the suggestion was more that of flowers that meant, business and cherries that had been picked and sent to market. It was a face peculiarly adapted to the drug trade, and to the process of coaxing people to want medicine. One could not survey its placid and gracious outline and fail to be convinced that he ought to be convinced that he ought to be convinced with its approval additional process. Such a face, beaming and insisting like a vision of one's own mother in a memory of boyhood's happy days, would sell any kind of medicine, sickness or no sickness. There was more than a garden in Lydia's countenance; it reached out, so to speak, and took in all the contiguous real estate, making it fertile and thick with blossoms. Other venders of proprietary specifies have tried the facial expedient in advertising from time to time, but the effect has been uniformly bungling and unprofitable. The ordinary countenance employed to inspire confidence in a given pill, plaster, or liniment is more likely to affect the observer with a sensation akin to that which succeeds over indulgence in green truit,

and thus to prejudice him against the thing past all argument or entreaty. That is where the deceased Lydia had the sinch on all imitators and competitors. Her face was made for her business rather than her business for her face. It had a distinctly pharmaceutical cast, as we have pointed out. All the features of it met and blended in one common assurance that whatever might be said about patent medicines, here was something that no family could afford to be without, even though bread might be scarce and the furniture mortgaged to secure the current month's Where that face was manifest, incredulity and disputation shrank back reproached and ashamed. There was noth ng for it but to ask the price, give up the oney, and take the medicine.

This face of the dead and gone Lydia could not be called a handsome one. There are prettier faces in plenty on perfumery bottles, lily white boxes, and packages of smoking tobacco. But every lineament of it bespoke sincerity, sympathy, and a kindly interest in the aches, gripes, and twinges of humanity. Its habitual and distinct marked expression was so serene, so amicable, so bountiful that it seemed to fulfil Emerson's notion of a face that confers a perpetual favor upon the world by simply being in and of it. There was a touch of sadness that implied experience and a heart acquainted with the work of alleviating distress. This was much better than the insiduating smile that characterizes the face of the young lady with the luxuriant head of hair who solicits patronage for the "magnolia balm," or the indefatigable grin female whose countenance is associated with the advertisements of "fragrant so zodont." Lydia understood the difficult art of sitting for a picture.

It will be many a day, no doubt, before we look upon another such face. Nature is provokingly economical in the matter of adapting faces to particular uses. The artistic sense of harmony and suitability is daily irritated in this respect by coming in contact with the wrong faces where the right ones ought to be. We are continually seeing the faces of butchers, bakers and candlestick-makers where we should find those of statesmen, poets and theolog ical students. There are pugilists who have the countenances of endowers of hospitals and art schools, just as there are bank presidents and judges on the bench who have the countenances of pawn brokers and country justices of the peace. We have even known able editors who labored under the disadvantage of being obliged to carry faces around with them which really belonged to bartenders. The visage of the departed Lydia, however, was wholly free from this common anach rouistic condition. It was a herald that did not have to be interpreted by contra ries; it never affected the spectator with an unpleasant feeling that it was out of place, or at all in need of apology or explanation; it was as clearly authentic and self-justifying as the multiplication table or the star spangled banner. Lydia her-self has ceased from out the scheme of mundane affairs, being mortal like the herbs and roots of which her- remedics were compounded; but the recollection of that face is sure to linger in the public mind so long as the public stomach shall continue to be agitated by patent medi-
