SOME FAMOUS AMERICANS.

Colonel Jacob Thompson Tells What He Knows About Them.

Colonel Jacob Thompson has been furnishing... He always took a deep drink just before beginning a speech...

He turned, he turns, he flies... "Benton was a very conceited man. He possessed considerable learning and a talent for what might be called 'complications.'"

"What is it?" I asked. "If ever you are in a position where I can help you, I want you to call on me."

"I promised and we separated. Notwithstanding this voluntary assurance of good will, there was no man in the North more vindictive against me than that very Stanton."

"I had every reason to be friendly to me. We had served together in the cabinet and it was I who first lifted him up. When I was secretary of the interior, under Buchanan I controlled the judicial fund and appointed Stanton to defend the interests of the United States in the Alameda quicksilver mine case in California."

"The fee Stanton got was \$25,000 and lifted him from absolute poverty to a position of final wealth. He forgot all that, though, and was violently opposed to me all through the war. Seward was a gentleman in bearing, very dignified, and in conversation, intelligent—something of the 'professor'—fair, tall, lean man, large features, heavy eyebrows. I never met Lincoln after '61, but I knew him well before that date. He and I served in the same Congress. Lincoln was always a great buffoon. He made Congress laugh and that was his aim. I am glad to point him out when he was a member of the House in 1845, as a future president, the joke would have been considered worse than an April fool affair. One of the speeches that Lincoln made during the Mexican war was quite humorous. He was opposed to the war, and he made a curious speculation as to the length of the line of wagons that would be required to hold the money spent on the war.
