derer in Jail-Killing an Old Lady. PITTSBURGH, Pa., June 11.—The Chronicle's Steubensville, Ohio, special says that Alex. Myatt, indicted for the murder of John Bird, and confined in the jail hung himself in his cell last night about midnight. Bird ran away with Myatt's wife and the latter followed to Steubensville, where he shot and killed Bird, on May 26th. A letter was found in his cell in which Myatt forgives his wife and implores her not to forsake the children.

The Murder of an Old Lady LAURA, Ohio. June 11 .- Mrs. Andrew Lasure, aged 70, was killed on Saturday night by John Tryfogle. Mrs. Lasure had gone to his house to remoustrate with him for permitting his cow to trespass on her premises. A quarrel arose, during which he threw a stone, striking her on the breast. Tryfogle escaped.

A Terrible Tragedy. GALVESTON, Texas, June 11 .- A terrible tragedy occurred in the Fort Worth jail Saturday night. A maniac named Wilson attacked another man named Hayes with a stool. Officers succeeded in pulling off the assailant when Hayes jumped up and severed Wilson's jugular voin with a pen-knife. The wounded man died in a few minutes.

The Trial of Conspirators Begun. LONDON, June 11 .- The trial of the six dynamite conspirators, Dr. Gallagher, Bernard Gallagher, Ausburgh, Curtin, Whitehead and Wilson, who were charged with treason felony, was begun to-day The court room was crowded, Lynch, alias Norman, the informer, was called to the stand and repeated the testimouy given by him at the preliminary hearing, in regard to the doings of the conspirators previous to and after their arrival in England from America.
