FIVE MONTHS OF IT. What a Democratic Administra on Has

Democrat " in Pittsburgh Times. Pennsylvania has been so long Republican that it is difficult for men to understand how a permanent change can take place. Old time politicians of the Repub-lican side still imagine that when the momentary disturbances over the division of the spoils in their party have passed away, an appeal to the war feeling, or to the so-called "business interests" will recall their old majority to the polls.

They say it is all over even now. They point to independent leaders in the Legis lature, co-operating in some of the basest swindles of Stalwartism, and wallowing again with their late antagonists in the mire of partisanship, and they profess to believe that this means the reconciliation of outraged voters also. It is difficult to tell whether they are themselves deceived or are only trying to deceive the world. They will, at all events, awake to a very different reality after the next election.

The Democratic party is the party of the people. Whenever it is true to itself, it is as much the party of the people to-day as it was when Jefferson led it to the overthrow of the monocrats, or Jack son marshalled it to the battle with the monopolies. It would give a fair and equal chance to all men and all classes in the race of life, and it would not allow the government to take the earnings of one and give them to another. This is Democracy-its fundamental principles Federalism, on the contrary, is paternal ism, class legislation, the enrichment of some at the expense of all. It regards the power of taxation as less a means of raising revenue than a means of taking property from those who create or earn it by their labor and giving it to those who enjoy the favor of government, or rather of the party which happens to ad minister the government. Hence the Federalist or Federalist Republican party is, ever was, and ever must be, the party of monopo'y of rings, of bosses, extravagance and high taxes. When these two parties go before the people in their true colors, there can be but one resultthe success of the Democracy is certain. It must live, because when it dies the re publican institutions, which it was found ed to defend, must perish with it.

Now let us see wherein the Democratic state administration has failed to measure up to the fundamental principles of De mocracy. Has it known a boss? Has it been controlled by rings? Not a whisper of scaudal has thus far been heard. There is not a man within the wide borders of this great commonwealth who does not believe in the personal integrity of the governor, and of his principal subordinates. Not a job has escaped his veto, not a suggestion of corruption has ever been heard within the precincts of the executive departments. Very different is all this from the Federalist administrations which preceded it, with the dark figures of the Camerous, the Kembles, the Quays, and the various chieftains of various rings, in the immediate background. And the policy, as distinguished from

the mere personal integrity and pecuniary all that was promised, and all that was desired. In manageral and message the governer has vigorourly assailed the blood sucking mon polics and tremendous cor porate powers which have heretofore bid defiauce to the laws of the commonwealth. He pushed bravely and persistently onward towards the liberation of trade and labor from the oppressive and capricious exactions of the carrying com panies, and the equalization of the bur dens of taxation. This is Democracy; it is the living and active principle. And in the Legislature the party has responded without hesitation. If it has not accomplished all that it set out to do in a single season it has accomplished more than was ever done in the state in the same period of time, and that under difficulties of the most serious nature. It has passed a free pipe bill, and given freedom to one of the greatest interests of the state. It has passed an anti-discrimination bill, and begun a reform which will end only when the railroads are brought into subjection to the constitution, and every citizen shall enjoy his equal rights upon the highways of the state.

If the people of Penusylvania do not sus tain the party which has given them the Pattison administration, then they do not desire honest, pure. Democratic government, but prefer rings, monopolies, bosses, and personal corruption, and the struggle for better things may as well be foregone. But they will sustain it. They will have some months to reflect before the next election. They will conclude that the remaining departments of government will be better managed if committed to men in full sympathy with the reform governor. The charm of Republican invincibility is broken. It will never be restored in this age. The Independent leaders may ge back to the house of bondage; but the Independent voters have broken out and it will be a marvel if they do not stay out.
