#### THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

MEETING OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Election of Teachers and Adjustment Their Salaries-The Report of the Su-

perintending Committee. An adjourned meeting of the board of directors of Lancaster school district was held Thursday evening to fix the salaries and elect teachers for the public schools of this city for the ensuing year. The following named members were

Messrs. Baker, Breneman, Brosius, Byrne, Carpenter, Cochran, Darmstetter, Byrne, Carpenter, Cochran, Darmstetter, Eberman, Evans, Gast, Hartman, Herr. Johnston, Marshall, McComsey, Mc-conomy, Morton, Oblender, Raub, Reimen-snyder, Rhoads, Richards, Ringwalt, Samson, Schwebel, Slaymaker, Smeych, Snyder, Spurrier, Warfel, Wilson, Chris tian Zecher, George W. Zecher, Lever

After the object of the meeting had been stated by the chair, Mr. Baker moved that the salaries of teachers be fixed for the ensuing year the same as they were last year.

Mr. Cochran said that since the salary of the musical instructor was fixed several years ago his duties had been largely increased by the creation of new schools and the adoption of the single room system in many of the old schools. He moved that the salary of the musical instructor be increased from \$500 to \$900.

The motion provoked a discussion which lasted for some time, when, on a sugges tion from the chair, the board took up the schools seriatim, commencing with the boys' high school, the salaries of which were fixed at last year's figures. Mr. Slaymaker moved that the salary of

Mis Sallie Bundle principal of the girls' high school, be increased from \$660 to \$700. and the salaries of her assistants, Misses Jackson and Erisman, be increased \$25 each making them respectively \$575 and \$525. The motion was rejected and the salaries were fixed the same as last year.
When the consideration of Miss Etter's East Lemon street school was reached Mr

Byrne moved to increase the salary from \$385 to \$395. Similar increase was made in the salaries of Misses Witmer, Downey, Musselman, Green and M. Zug to equalize them with the salaries of other first assistants in secondary schools. Miss Sue Stanley's salary was increased from \$330 to \$385 to equalize it with other secondary econd assistants.

When the salary of musical instructor was reached Mr. Cochran presented a preamble and resolution making it a part of the musical instructor's duty to give lessons in music to the teachers, at such times and places as the board of directors shall appoint, and to increase his salary from \$500 to \$900 per annum. Mr. Coch ran said it was impossible for the musical instructor to do justice to the For sale by H. B. Cochran, Druggist, 137 and the present arrangement. When the office was created some years ago there were only 19 schools; now there are 40. Mr. Cochran's motions to increase the salary from \$500 to \$900 was voted down, as was also a subsequent. stion to increase it to \$700. A motion to increase it to \$600 was adopted.

Your committee, to whom was referred the question of reorganizing the primary and secondary schools, as suggested in the report of the city superintendent, beg leave to report that after carefully considering the matter, and as a full committee visiting schools conducted on the present three division plan, and also some conducted on the two division plan, and having also conferred with the principals of such schools, they are unanimously in favor of the proposed change. Among the advantages which such an organization would secure may be mentioned, first, uniformity of organization throughout the city. At present New street, Manor street, Lemon street, James street, South Mulberry street, East Orange street, one of the schools on South Duke street and one on Prince street, are conducted on the plan of two divisions, while the remainder, less than one half, are organized on the plan of three divisions. Secondly, uniform requirements for pupils and teachers of nominally the same grade, and consequently greater harmony. Thirdly, avoidance of difficulties

in case of the removal of pupils from one district to another.

Fourthly Emulation between the schools and teachers of the same grade, thus securing more rapid and uniform pro-

Fifthly. A closer approach to the constitution of the family, where children of different attainments are associated to the great advantage of the younger members. Sixthly. A longer continuance with the same teacher than under our present sys tem of frequent promotions. The short-ness of the time during which pupils now remain with the same teacher, and the consequent transfer from a teacher who knows to one who knows them not, occasions waste of time as well as instruction. most effectually preventing the teacher's influence from being felt in the formation of the child's character.

Seventhly. The equalizing of the pri-mary schools and the prevention of overcrowding in the lower grades while the next higher have barely sufficient to con stitute a school. As an illustration it may be stated that some years ago the superin tending committee on examination found the following condition of affairs in the combined primary schools organized on

the three division plan : In the 12 schools there were enrolled 1,816 pupils. Of this number the 12 principals were teaching 273, the 12 first assistants 567, and the 12 second assistants 976, more than one half of the whole number, or an average of 23, 47 and 81 to each teacher of

the respective grades. Eighthly, Teachers of greater experience will be in charge of the smallest pupils, thus securing additional advantages to those most in need of them. Respectfully submitted,
