TOBACCO MARKET. IN NEW YORK AND LANCASTER.

seed Leaf, Sumatra and Havana for th Week Enging Saturday, June 30, 10 A. M.

U. S. Tobacco Journal. As was predicted last week, the sale of 1,400 cases '82 Pennsylvania, which virti ally opened the market for this stock,

brought about all through this week a rush and a scramble for the same. Manu facturers as well as jobbers vied with each other to rocure noted packings ; in consequence prices have advanced several cents, and quotations for choice parcels were, at the time of going to press, 20 to 22 cents.

The current of business running so swiftly this week towards '82 Pennsylva nia, drew along the '82 Connecticut tobacco, which, as far as the wrappers are concerned, had remained neglected till now. Though the sales reported were not very large the investment in the same by manufacturers goes to prove a somewhat better estimation of this stock.

The '82 Wisconsin is very popular at present. Its cheapuess for wrapping purposes in the better grades as well as that suitable for good binder material draws many investors; and while the profit to packers is but small, it is nevertheless sat-isfactory when compared with the capital invested. In old stock very little is being done. As long as the prices for new goods remain low old stock has very little show except at normal figures.

As we have said in many of our previous reviews during this year, a stable and reliable market in seed leaf for the re mainder of the year depends entirely upon the action of importers of Sumatra after

this date. A clear survey of the stocks of new Sumatra can be had in a few days. As long as importers will not ask buyers to pay the additional duty, a heavy business in this commodity will take place, to the injury of the seed leaf market. Holders of seed leaf must not allow themselves to be deceived by the present flurry in the market. It is, after all, but a one-sided prosperity affecting the '82 Pennsylvania, and only because of its apparent good quality and comparative cheapness. The The seed leaf market as a whole is in no flourishing condition by any means. To bring about a real lively, paying business all around, we need an export trade and

higher prices for Sumatra. Nevertheless, even the partial improve ment in the market is a boom to be appre ciated.

AN ADAMS ON THE CLASSIUS.

N. Y. Sun. Mr. Adams' judgment of the artistic merit of Latin and Greek writings cannot be taken for much. Against him we have only to set the scholars of all ages and nations who have enjoyed and still enjoy nations who have enjoyed and still enjoy with delight the rich imagery of Homer, the dainty sweetness of Anacreon and Theocritus, the majesty of Æschylus, of Sophocles, and of Euripides, the elegance of Virgil, the delicate fancy of Horace, and the swelling periods of Cicero, to say nothing of other classic written arch of nothing of other classic writers, each of whom has his peculiat excellence. Mr. Adams' insinuation that the admiration of these writers is pretanded, and not real, is as absurd as would be the conclusion of a blind man that the people who say they admire paintings and sculptures do not tell the truth, or of a deaf man that no one can really enjoy listening to music When, too, Mr. Adams comes to the utilitarian department of the subject, he shows himself either singularly ignorant or singularly forgetful. He would have the college student learn German and French as a means of becoming acquainted with German and French literature, but considering that German is first cousin to Greek, and French the direct offspring of Latin, it is incredible that he should fail to observe that there can be no thorough knowledge of the one in either case without a knowledge of the other. Busides, an important result of knowing German and French is the ability to study scientific works published in those languages and not translated into English. Mr. Adams must surely be aware that scientific nomenclature is largely made up of Greek and Latin compounds, which are nearly the same in all modern languages, and that a man who knows Greek and Latin can avail himself, with but a smattering of German and French, of the labors of German and French writers on natural science. As to conversation in German and French, it is notorious that no mere study of books will make it easy, or even possible. Educated English Statesmen. S. Y. Tribune.


