Paris, July 14.—Extensive preparations were made for the celebration to day, the national fele day, commemorating the taking of the Bastile and the laying of the foundations of the Republic in 1789. A

The unveiling in the Place Chateau d'Eau of the great statue of the Republic, which was one of the chief features of the day's festivities, took place this morning, with appropriate ceremonies, in the presence of senators, members of the Chamber of Deputies, municipal councillors and a

vast concourse of people. The statue represents a woman erect and holding upward in her right hand an olive branch as an emblem of peace, while the left rests on a shield inscribed with the words, "Les Droits de l'Homme." The statue will rest immediately on a column, which, again, will be supported on an upper pedestal surrounded by white marble figures of Liberty, Equality and Fraternity. On the front of the lower portion of the huge mass of stone culminated by the statue will appear just above lion and between two of a trio of figures typifying the mo'to of repul-licanism the subjoined inscription:
"A La Gloire De La Republique Fran
