TO-DAY'S NATIONAL ANNIVERSARY. The Popular Festival of France Celebrated in Paris and New York-The Great Status of the Republic Unveiled.

PARIS, July 14.—Extensive preparations were made for the celebration to day, the national fete day, commemorating the taking of the Bastille and the laying of the foundations of the Republic in 1789.

The unveiling in the Place Chateaux d'Eau of the great statue of the Republic, which was one of the chief features of the day's festivities, took place this morning.

The statue represents a woman erect and holding upward in her right hand an olive branch as a symbol of peace, while the left rests on a shield inscribed with the words, "Les Droits de l'Homme."

The statue will rest immediately on a column, which, again, will be supported on an upper pedestal, surrounded by the marble figures of Liberty, Equality and Fraternity.
